**Spence Makes Ruling.**  
PENDLETON, Ore. — A warehouseman may not charge storage on grain held beyond the surrender date of warehouse receipts, according to an opinion made by C. E. Spence, state market agent. The question was raised by W. W. Harrah of Pendleton.

According to a statement by Mr. Harrah, this ruling will save wheat farmers one-third of a cent a bushel on their warehouse charges. Warehousemen have been charging the practice of charging \$3 a ton every 30 days for storage and 10 cents additional each month or fraction of a month, even though the grain had been ordered out. Such a practice has put a premium on slow service, he declared and if it is discarded he predicted an improvement in service.

## REED EXPECTS MORE SCANDAL

Missouri Senator, Out for Presidency, Plays McAdoo in Address.

**ST. LOUIS, Mo., (By AP).** — James A. Reed, informally opening his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination Monday night declared that in his opinion "not one-tenth of the inquiry which has existed is laid bare" in referring to oil disclosures.

He charged William Gibbs McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury and an opponent for the nomination, expected to receive \$1,104,000 in loan fees from E. L. Doherty, oil magnate, the Charles W. Morse interests and motion picture concerns, although he "did not appear in a single law suit."

The senator reiterated his platform against "oppressive tariffs" and for reduction of taxes, adjustment of compensation to soldiers, elimination of useless courts and the result of the government, spirit of justice and opposition laws curbing the "concentration of power at the capital" and protection of the "freedom of the people as reserved in the constitution and bill of rights."

He reviewed the oil scandal and said the disclosures "swamp" anything that the people of the United States were, by bribery, deprived of these great oil deposits upon which the nation must rely in the hour of extremity."

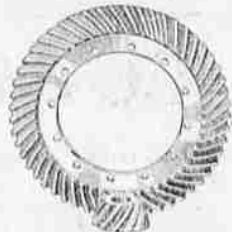
