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If Conditions Justify

We notice with some interest that senators from the northwest states are seeking government aid in the way of advanced credit in agricultural sections where finances have gone awry and the communities are broke.

In reply to this request President Coolidge has answered the senators that he favors advanced credit "if local conditions justify."

In those four words lie the whole trouble. If local conditions justified extending credit there would be no trouble in getting it in different localities for there is plenty of money on the Pacific coast, but local conditions do not justify when measured by good, sound business.

To prevent further financial disaster in some of the northwest sections the government or some other agency must take a long chance, violate the rules of business and extend credit where debts already are piled high.

(Continued from page 1) he had delivered the message to "McAdoo and Palmer as per your instructions." (In other messages there are references to Francis McAdoo, of New York, believed by some to be the son of W. G. McAdoo.)

Under the date of January 22, 1924, Major wired McLean that A. Mitchell Palmer (former attorney general and counsel for McLean) had gained the impression from Senator Walsh that McLean would not be called before the committee. This message added that "other people were working on Walsh."

CLIMAX NEAR IN BETTER WARFARE ON DAUGHERTY WASHINGTON (AP)—The situation with respect to Mr. Daugherty was further discussed at another White House conference late Tuesday night, participated in by President Coolidge, Frank W. Stearns, chief personal and political friend of the executive, William M. Butler, manager of the campaign to bring about the nomination of Mr. Coolidge as the Republican presidential candidate, and C. Simpson Slomp, secretary to the president.

The conference was understood to have considered the possible resignation of Mr. Daugherty from a political viewpoint and also the advisability of retaining the attorney general on the list of Coolidge delegates-at-large from Ohio to the Republican national convention next June.

After President Coolidge had conferred with him for two hours at the White House Tuesday night, Mr. Daugherty's enemies were predicting that his resignation would not be long forthcoming.

The attorney general's friends, at the same time, were reiterating that he stood by his determination not to resign under fire and claiming that President Coolidge had no intention of asking him to do so.

(Continued from page 1) with its indorsement, after several weeks of hearings in which delegations from all the wheat producing states appeared for and against the proposed legislation. Drawn by Senator McNary in cooperation with Chairman Haug cooperation with Chairman

La Grande, republican, Iowa, of the house agriculture committee, the bill was indorsed by the Northwestern cooperative wheat marketing association and other prominent farm organizations. It proposes that the corporation set up under its provisions be empowered to market about the "exportable surplus" of staple farm products particularly wheat and livestock, and to charge back to the grower the difference between the foreign price and a "ratio price" to be established from time to time. In determining the "ratio exchange value," or the price of a commodity, the corporation would attempt to compute a value equal in purchasing power to the price paid to farmers over a period of normal years, set aside to meet the deficit expected to result from the sale of the exportable surplus of such commodity. Producers would receive script to show equity in the premium.

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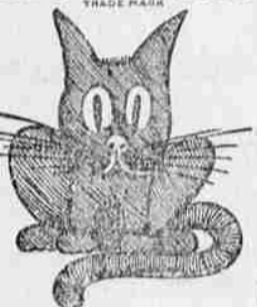
