COMPARES LAXITY OF MODERN LIVING TO 13TH CENTURY

IOWA CITY, Ia. (AP)—Censorship 700 years ago consisted of cutting out the army and "mopping up everybody and everything offensive to the ruling puritanical mind," according to Prof. Nellie

"From about the middle of the thirteenth century to early in the fourteenth, sheels and banners, Sarabhs were having their heyday in the romantic literature of southern France and 'black ocean' roamed wild through Provence," says Prof. Aurne, "Trombidore poetry reflected the spirit of the times."

"So romantic had the people of this region become that they put loyalty in one's body above everything else, even the church and state."

"This struck too much of the harem to suit those in power. The Albigensian crusade of 1209 was begun to correct the situation. Southern France was so much bloodied and brutally people, shocked of the affairs, Trombidore poetry and all its kind went into a decline. When the smoke lifted the region had won, but the idea carried over the stories that grew up about King Arthur and the knight of the Round Table."

"The present school of sentimental literature is a reproduction, with important differences, of the thought of the earlier period. The church in both instances has disapproved of any departure from the puritanical style which characterized the accepted school of both ages."

"No one style is suitable to the flexible demands of the modern world, with its varying phases of a highly complex civilization. In spite of the fact that there is much that is cruel and disgusting in our present literature the best of it points to something finer and richer."
