STORY OF DEADLY ARIZONA FEUD IS "TO THE LAST MAN"

Not a motion picture based on a story, but a photodrama which actually breathes the spirit of the original tale and personality of the author, is Paramount's new picture "To the Last Man," a Zane Grey production, now play at the Arcade theatre. Mr. Grey spent several summers winning the confidence of the inhabitants of the Tonto Basin, Arizona, from whom he learned the story of the famous Pleasant Valley war, a feud of the late eighties which was fought out heroically to the "last man."

Gaston Isabel, leader of the cattlemen and Lee Jolly, leader of the sheepmen, are old enemies. Both have come to the Tonto Basin from Texas with their sympathizers. Knowing that a fight is coming, Gaston Isabel sends for his son Jean, who is a trapper in Oregon. Meeting Helen, Jolly's daughter, on his way to the valley, Jean falls in love with her.

Later when Jean traces cattle rustlers to the Jolly ranch, the Jollys retaliate by raiding the Isabel home. In the battle, Guy Isabel and one of the children are killed. The following day, Gaston is shot down treacherously and the Isabels pursue the Jollys. In an ambush, all the Isabels are wiped out except Jean, who carries on the fight single-handed. He kills the last of the

Jolly sympathizers and ends by marrying Helen. Thus the feud is ended.

This is the first of Mr. Grey's novels to be made into a picture under his new contract with Paramount. Mr. Grey was present when the picture was being taken. As a result of his assistance, the photodrama breathes the love of the outdoors. It is the story of the lives of primitive men with primitive hates and a love of fighting. Louis Wilson, Richard Dix, Frank Campau, Robert Edison and Noah Beery are the principal players.

Income Tax Tips

No. 26.

If for any reasonable cause, such as illness or absence, a taxpayer can not file his income tax return within the time prescribed by law, application may be made before the date the return is due to the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer lives or has his principal place of business for an extension not to exceed 30 days. As a condition of granting the extension, the collector may require the submission of a tentative return and estimate of the tax and the payment of one-fourth of the estimated amount of the tax. A tentative return should be made on the usual return form, marked "tentative" at the top, and should contain a statement of the estimated amount of the tax, believed to be due, and the property owned. No other data need be given. Tentative returns will not be accepted unless permission is obtained previous to filing. A copy of the authority to file the tentative return must be attached thereto.

If before the end of a 30-day extension granted by a collector an accurate return can not be made, appeal for a further extension must be made to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. Except in the case of taxpayers who are abroad, no such extension shall be made for more than six months. Additional extensions will not be granted by the commissioner without a clear showing that a complete return can not be made by the end of the 30-day period.

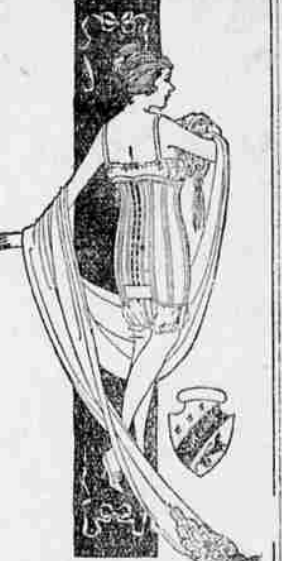
