The recreation committee of the L. D. S. church of La Grande will present "Putting It Over," a comedy drama, at Imbler Saturday night according to announcements today.

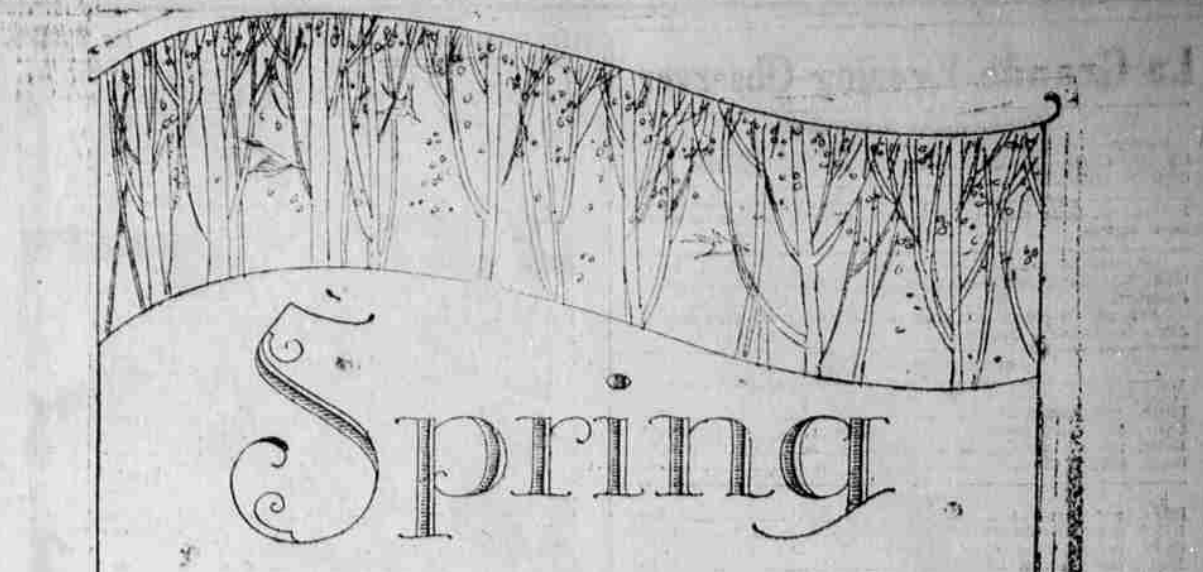

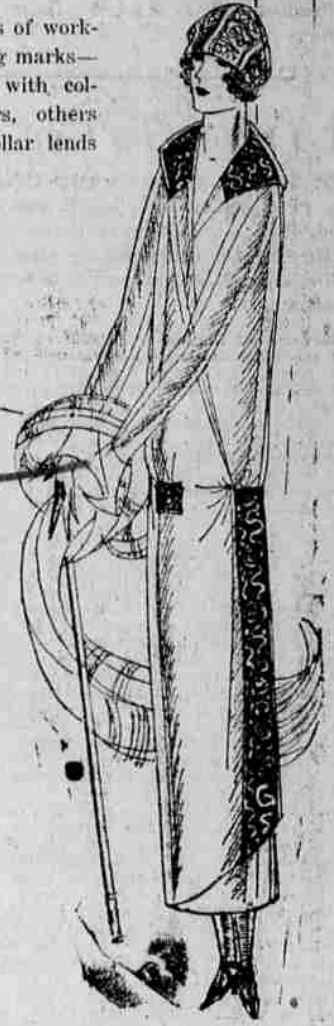
