## YOUNGER CLUB INCREASE SEEN

Boys and Girls Organization in Oregon Showed Upward Trend in 1923.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis. (Special) — Oregon has had an increase in the number of boys' and girls' clubs during the year of 1923. There are now 542 clubs with an enrollment of 6727. Members numbering 3971 completed their projects. This was an enrollment increase of 65 per cent.

The boys' and girls' clubs are continually growing throughout the United States according to the official records of the United States department of agriculture of January 23, 1923. During the year 29,200 clubs were organized, making an enrollment of 609,575. This was an increase in organization of 12 per cent over the previous year and a completion of enrollment of 52 per cent, or 18 per cent less than the average for Oregon.

"In the different contents only a limited number can win," says H. M. Gore, assistant secretary of agriculture for the United States. "But you cannot take from the boy or girl who has undertaken this work the benefits of sustained effort along a given line. The value of friendship, contact, and that of seeing different situations acquired by the boys and girls when they are called upon in years to come to take charge of this great agricultural machine of ours."

Mr. Gore believes that while prizes are desirable to possess, the friendships, force of work, loyalty and other by-products of the club work are the things upon which the fabric of society are based.

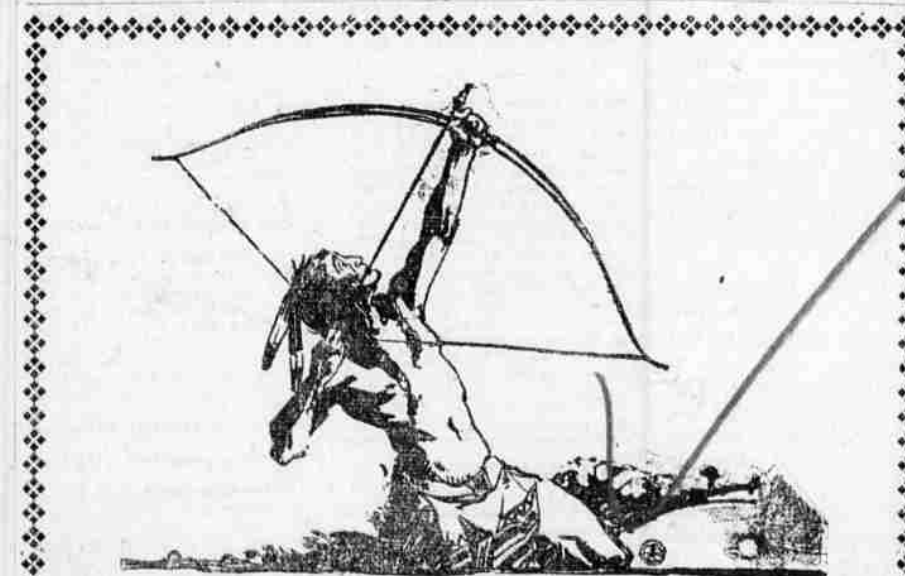
