Neither the White House nor the justice department would make any predictions regarding his course after he arrives, but it was tacitly conceded that his first duty would be to report to the president and probably learn without delay of a final decision regarding his retention in office.

sitting of eligibles to succeed to the post of attorney general, a process on which there was further consideration Thursday in administration quarters and which progressed during the day to the point where a selection of a successor could be made quickly.

The attitude toward the appointment of the three jurists under consideration—former Senator Kenyon of Iowa, now a federal circuit judge; Chief Justice Wilbur of California; and Federal District Judge Delich of Idaho—is now known to President Coolidge.

Friends of Judge Kenyon here reported that they believed he would entail his relinquishment of a life position on the federal bench. Chief Justice Wilbur conferred recently with President Coolidge and a retinue in the east tentatively visiting friends in North Carolina.

The personal views of Judge Delich on the situation also have been sent to Washington and they are believed to have decreased the likelihood of his selection.

Governor Groesbeck of Michigan, another mentioned as a possible successor to Mr. Daugherty, was a White House caller Thursday in company with Michigan friends, and has another appointment for Friday. He insisted he knew of no discussion of his name in connection with the cabinet appointment.

STATISTICS TELL COST OF SENDING GIRL TO COLLEGE

ST. LOUIS, (AP)—Increase in tuition, board, room and fees, rather than in the amount spent by students for books, dues, contributions and incidentals, are responsible for the rise in the cost of attending college, according to a survey made by the St. Louis branch of the American Association of University Women.

A study of "catalogue expense" covering the fixed charges as set by the college authorities and of "extra-catalogue expense," which included all other expenses of the school year excepting clothing and railroad fare, was made in 114 colleges and universities.

The average catalogue expense for the institutions studied was \$464.04. The average extra-catalogue expense was \$168.25, which means that the average college woman spends \$632.29 every school year, according to the report.

The committee made the investigation as an aid to parents, to educational and vocational counselors, to administrators of scholarship

and loan funds and to others who need to budget the expense attending a co-ed while she is in school.

Islands Stocked with Deer.

CORDOVA, Alaska, (AP)—Islands in Prince William Sound near

here are being stocked with deer by the United States government. Ten of the animals brought from Tannar Island, southeastern Alaska, recently were taken to Montezuma Island in the Sound. This colonization work is expected to be extended to the Kenai peninsula on the mainland west of here, Alaska's best known game district.



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
