Beautiful Concert Given

With every seat occupied in the new Presbyterian church, Sunday evening the first musical concert of a series of high class concerts was rendered to a delighted congregation. The church with all of its equipment presented a splendid atmosphere in which to allow the musicians to bring their message of music and this they did with rare taste. The program was in line with the new sanctuary and allowed each artist full opportunity for the display of his or her talent. In a real spirit of worship the order of the service went forward with a precision which indicated the preparation made for the concert.

One of the most delightful features of the program was the newly formed quartette of mixed voices. This is not only the best but has the distinction of being the only mixed quartette of cultivated voices in La Grande. Each member of this quartette is a musician of the best quality and a soloist of high caliber. Mrs. A. L. Richardson, an director and soprano of the quartette is excellent and her clear, cultivated voice is a credit to La Grande. Mrs. W. H. Robinson, Jr., contralto, disclosed a voice of lovely quality in Schubert's "Ave Maria," as she also did in numbers with the quartette. G. L. Dutton, tenor, has an exquisite tone of voice and it appeared that his solo, "The Holy City," had been written especially for his fine clear voice with its delicacy of feeling. The last member of the quartette, but not the least is Prof. E. D. Towler, who possesses a voice of great resonance and rare beauty and being highly cultivated his selection from the Oratorio "St. Paul," by Mendel-

son was given with great feeling. La Grande is very fortunate to have a quartette with the ability for this one, which is equally as good as the one of the First Presbyterian church of Portland. So well was the concert attended last evening and so liberal were the presents in giving an offering it is not believed that many concerts will be necessary before sufficient funds will be made to purchase a piano for the church.

LONDON EXTENDS JOY HOURS DURING EMPIRE EXHIBITION

LONDON, (AP)—London is a place where nearly everyone seems to bid early and gets up late, but just to please the tourist joy-seekers coming to the Empire Exhibition, it is going to let people have a good time up to 2 o'clock in the morning five days a week this summer. At present cabarets, restaurants and hotel ball rooms close a little after midnight except on extension nights when one can dance until 2 o'clock in the morning. From April 1 until the Exhibition closes, every night will be extension night except Saturday and Sunday.

The London County Council, chief regulating authority on public behavior, has just yielded to widespread demand for making London a little gayer during the exhibition. But it hasn't yet yielded to the request that the late dancers be allowed to keep on buying champagne until the orchestra stops. Unless this is done the people out for a good time will have to buy enough liquor before 12:30 to keep them merry until 2.
