OLD PISTOL IS SAVER OF LIFE

Amazing Story Is Related
by William Gates, Ac-
cused of Murder.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—An old fashioned derringer, forgotten for two days as he lay bound and handcuffed while Richard Heaton, 35 years old, his friend and former business associate methodically prepared to perform an operation, saved William Gates, 21, from mutilation or death, according to Gates' confession to police Sunday.

Gates Sunday night was being held on a charge of murder growing out of the shooting to death early Saturday night of Heaton. He unfolded an amazing drama of revenge, according to police.

Held Up and Kidnaped.

Gates said that at Heaton's request he went to the office of Heaton and Fisher, merchant brokers, Thursday night and that Heaton and a "mysterious stranger" held him up with pistols, handcuffed him and took him in an automobile to a house on Thirty-fourth street, where he was confined in what was apparently an improvised operating room.

When he was asked he was relieved of his pistol, he declared, Heaton, according to Gates' story, immediately began to prepare for an operation. Gates, fainted and mumbled something about some letters he had written, saying that if anything happened to him Heaton would be responsible.

Used His Derringer.

Saturday night someone later it developed that it was Mrs. Heaton—came to the house. Shortly after that, he declared, Heaton entered the room and at his request, released him and led him to the bathroom. Upon arising, he used his derringer.

Obituary

Paralysis Is Fatal.

NORTH POWDER, Ore. (Special)—Mrs. Homer Carnes was stricken by a paralytic stroke recently while helping to move to their new home, that proved fatal. The deceased was assisting her husband prepare the articles for removal and as Mrs. Carnes started to get into their car, she fell across the two children in a faint. She seemed to rally at the time and took her place at the steering wheel but a second attack came, and her husband, discovering her condition, took her to the Baker hospital but she never regained consciousness and died soon afterwards.

Paralysis is believed the cause of her demise. The sad news was telegraphed to Tokyo to the former home of Mrs. Carnes, and her parents, who lived in the city of Tokyo.

Mrs. and Mrs. Carnes have lived the greater part of their lives near North Powder and her survivors have the sympathy of the entire community in their sudden and sad bereavement.

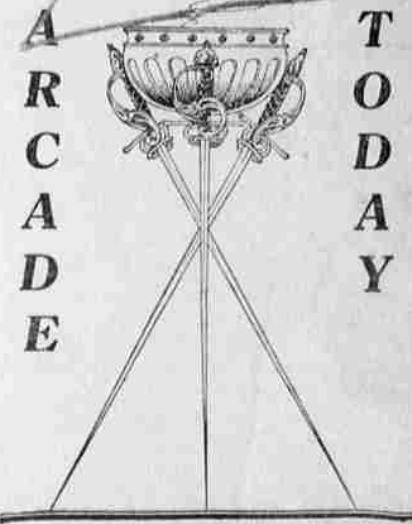

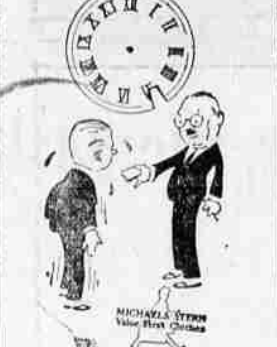
