FARMER-LABOR PARTY STRONG

Minnesota Political Interest Centers in Group—Primary Election to Be in June.

ST. PAUL, (AP)—Minnesota's presidential preference probably will be expressed in various congressional district conventions and state gatherings here this month under separate calls to each major party, but in the state-wide primary in June, each party will nominate candidates for United States senator and congressman, and state and local offices to be voted on in the November election.

Minnesota's three parties are the republican, farmer-labor and democratic, and again the farmer-labor party will be the center of interest when it seeks to elect a United States senator for the six-year term in succession of the late Knute Nelson.

As to presidential choices, there has been little campaigning, but the republican party's state central committee, in adopting its convention plans, accepted the program drawn by members admittedly favorable to the candidacy of President Calvin Coolidge in the face of a telegram from Hiram Johnson urging that a state primary be held in Minnesota.

On the democratic side, while William G. McAdoo is declared by supporters to have a strong following in the state, a favorite son candidate is being put forward by many who urge support of Dr. C. M. Johnson of Rochester, whose friends declare he "would consider" any such action favorably, despite his public announcement that he did not wish to be considered.

Presidential choices may not be shown in the various conventions, however, for it is optional whether a delegate wishes to definitely insinuate a delegation or send them uncommitted. Each of the ten district conventions will select two delegates to the republican convention, and the state convention will choose the other seven delegates at large.

Magnus Johnson, the "dirt farmer" senator elected from this state, was elected on the farmer-labor ticket to serve out the unexpired term of Senator Nelson after the latter's death last year, winning decisively over Governor J. A. O. Prons.

Now Senator Johnson, whose family had intimated that he would run for governor instead of the senate next fall, has announced that he will seek the election to the six-year senatorial term.

Just what his democratic and republican opposition will be has not developed. Governor Prons has indicated he will not be a candidate, and to date the matter of opposition for Johnson is an unanswered question.

It is on this senatorial contest and the fight for governor that the greatest interest will center in Minnesota.

Several farmer-laborites have been mentioned as gubernatorial possibilities, but a selection will not be made until the state convention, the day for which has not yet been announced. Candidates for the democratic nomination remain shrouded in uncertainty.

Among the candidates in the field for the republican nomination are George Jacob, mayor of Minneapolis, O. B. Jacobson, member of the state railroad and warehouse commission, and Franklin F. Ellsworth.

A number of leaders of the farmer-labor and non-partisan league groups are seeking to bring about a complete political union under a

BRITAIN WILL PUT ON SHOW

LONDON (INS)—Great Britain will spend \$100,000,000 this summer to show the world the glories of her empire.

A monster parent, to be known as the British Empire Exhibition, is now driving forward to completion and will be opened to the public next month. The exhibition will continue for six months and it is the belief of the backers of the enterprise that 25,000,000 people will come from all parts of the world to see their show.

The exhibition will cost the British empire ten times as much as it will bring in. If the expectations of the managers are fulfilled and 25,000,000 people gain the turnstile, receipts from admissions will not amount to more than \$10,000,000. That leaves approximately \$90,000,000 which the empire must pay for the privilege of displaying to the world a composite picture of its resources.

The British government, the governments of the various dominions, colonies and dependencies of the empire and the business men of all countries that fly the British flag will put up that \$90,000,000. If necessary to make the show a success they will put up added millions.

Despite the cries of poverty and hard times that arise from every section of British industry and the serious pronouncements of British business and British citizens have to bear, officials of the exhibition have not reported any exceptional difficulty in raising the money. It has not been an easy task, of course, to finance so extensive an undertaking, but officials state that the response to their appeals from governments and private sources has been encouraging at all stages of the proceedings.

The reason British industry has been willing to spend huge sums for promoting the exhibition, despite the nation's claims of industrial hard times, is because British business men believe the exposition will promote trade. It is confidently expected that the money spent in showing the industrial resources of the empire will come back manifold through expanded trade channels.

the best time to advertise" one of the officials of the exhibition said. "This show is intended to advertise the business of the British Empire. We think we will get our money back many times over."

The British government, despite complaints of high taxation, already has guaranteed approximately \$1,000,000 for the exposition. Efforts are now being made with apparent prospects of success, to obtain an additional government appropriation of \$5,000,000.

In addition to appropriations from the home government, huge sums are being spent by the various dominion and colonial governments to insure that their particular part of the empire is adequately represented. India, Canada and Australia have made appropriations of approximately \$1,000,000 each, and the high commissioners of these countries in London are planning soon to ask their home governments for additional appropriations, without which enterprises already undertaken cannot be completed. The Union of South Africa, Newfoundland, Borneo, Malay, Sarawak, Ceylon, Bermuda, Fiji, Hong Kong, British Guiana, Malta, Palestine, Cyprus and various other countries and groups of countries under the Union Jack have made appropriations ranging from \$100,000 to \$500,000, many of which probably will have to be doubled before work new under way is finished.
