LENROOT QUILTS OIL COMMITTEE; LADD SUCCEEDS

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retirement of Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin as chairman and member of the oil committee Tuesday overshadowed other developments in the oil inquiry. He will be succeeded by Senator Ladd of North Dakota, a Republican identified with the La Follette group, who has been actively in charge of the committee since the departure of Senator Lenroot for Southern Pines, N. C., a week ago to recuperate.

Senator Lenroot's letter of resignation was made public after the oil investigators had cleared up some of the remaining mysteries in the celebrated McLean telegram by a grueling cross examination of John F. Major, agent of the Washington publisher.

"Why yes, they were, Senator, to the best of my recollection, as I told you," the witness replied.

McLean then said that at the conference he had with Hall at Atlantic City last December Hall asked him if he would say that he had loaned him the \$100,000 in cash instead of loaned checks.

"Full assured me," McLean said, "that the loan had nothing to do with Sinclair and Teapot Dome."

McLean insisted that his credit was good at the time he gave Hall the checks and that he could have raised \$200,000 if necessary.

He said Hall agreed to advise him before undertaking to cash the checks.

McLean said he had never rendered any service as a dollar-a-year secret agent of the department of justice and that the only purpose of his testimony was to enable him by making the loans, to get through police lines in strange cities when traveling with President Harding's party.

Asked about "Principal" in the telegram, McLean said he did not know who the principal was unless it was Senator Charles McNary said Danaherly was the author of the message telling him not to worry and that he knew what to depend upon.

McLean said he invited Stepp to come to Florida last December and that in November 1922 he bought 2,000 shares of Pure Oil stock and sold it in February, 1923, at a profit of \$5,500.

A. W. MELLON HELD NOT ORIGINATOR OF TAX PROGRAM

WASHINGTON (Special) — The American Bankers League, with headquarters here, in a statement based points out that the principle upon which the Mellon rates are based was first submitted to Congress by Hon. Carter Glass when he was Secretary of the Treasury.

The statement also calls attention to the fact that Secretary Glass' recommendations were endorsed by President Wilson and, later, by Secretary Hamilton. Secretary Mellon, it is claimed, merely gave his unqualified approval to the Glass principles, and turned the problem of translating the principles into rates over to the treasury and statisticians in the Treasury Department.

The subject underwent a most searching investigation at the hands of the most experienced and capable experts in the service of the government, and a tax rate was evolved from the accumulated experience of the government as revealed by official records and established facts.

The predominant thought of all those engaged in the preparation of the

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measure was to develop schedules best adapted to the application of the principle recognized by the last three secretaries of the Treasury.

This information is based, according to the statement, in order to encourage a return to non-partisanship in dealing with the subject, which the League claims was handled on this basis until Congressman Garner promulgated and introduced into the House Ways and Means committee a set of rates. The action of the House, it is claimed, was in violation of the Lower House in calling for a caucus and adopting the Garner rates, and making them a test of Democracy, has injected a political phase into the matter which is preventing the proper solution of this purely economic problem, it is claimed.

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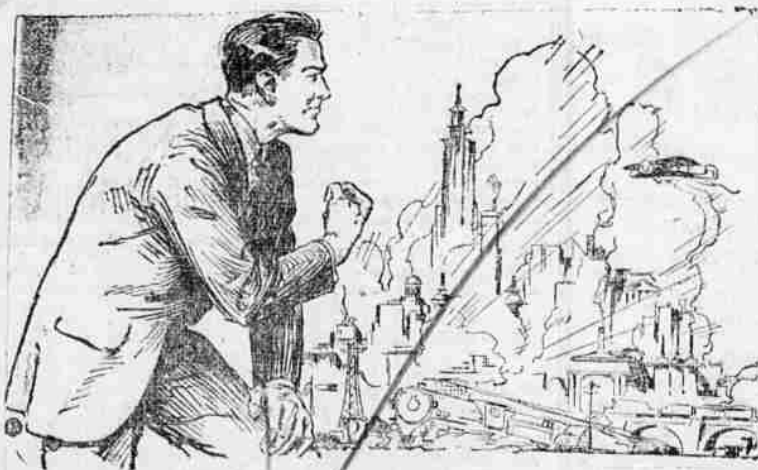
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
