DEMAND FOR BETTER LITERATURE IS NOTED IN LIBRARY REPORTS

CHICAGO, (AP)—If the mind of the average American is indicated in the selection of his books and works of art, then matter tending to a sobriety of thought and a desire for knowledge predominates over what some critics and philosophers have termed the "jazz age" and its appeal for material regarding sex, scandal and the criminal. The most noted increase is in the general subject of religion.

Large libraries in division points of the country, universities, libraries, music and art institutions, publishers and dealers without exception report an interest in reading and the arts not observed in recent years. The popular demand for groups embraces the subjects of religion, biography, psychology, etiquette, science, astronomy, radio, drama, poetry, home economics and vocations. Fiction circulation maintains its position but librarians report the public is requiring that it be clean.

Art and music enjoy a demand not heretofore as pronounced, due primarily to widespread activity of federations and organizations which are endeavoring to promote their interest in the home and community.

Oregon, March 8, 1924; is survived by her husband J. B. Eaton; five sons—A. E. Patterson, San Ysidro, California; Allen H. Eaton, New York City; Rufus V. Eaton, Emmett, Idaho; Lester B. Eaton, Portland, Oregon; Robert E. Eaton, La Grande, Oregon; and one sister—Mrs. Charles Brock, now of Salem, Oregon. In early girlhood she lived for several years at or near Kirbyville in Southern Oregon, attended school at Salem in 1861 and in 1862 came with the family to Grande Ronde Valley, where she lived until 1910, when she moved to Salem, Oregon, where she lived till the time of her death. Her life had been a very busy and devoted one. She was kindly, charitable, and loved her friends with all her heart.

In her younger days she affiliated with the Methodist church, but in later years attended churches of all denominations. During her residence in Salem she attended the Bible church of the United Brethren near her home, for the most part. She was an active worker in civic, charitable and kindred endeavors and was a member of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Red Cross and orders of like character; was widely known throughout the State, especially in Union County, where she spent most of her life. It was her wish to be buried in Union by the side of her young daughter, who passed on a number of years ago, and Union was dear to her as the place where many of her dearest friends dwell. Her father, James K. Henderson, was an Oregon pioneer of 1852.

The remains of Mrs. Minerva Eaton arrived in Union from Salem Monday on No. 24. Short funeral services were held at Cook Bros. Undertaking parlors, services by Rev. Quinn of the Methodist Church. He read from the 7th chapter of Revelations. The choir sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere." The funeral was largely attended by old neighbors and friends, many coming from La Grande, Cove, North Powder and Medford Springs to pay their last respects to this good woman. Her body was recently clad in a silk night gown and light silk underwear and was bruised and cut. The body had been jammed into the trunk and was held in position by ropes. A small rug was tied around her head.

Dr. Roy Wilson, city physician, expressed the opinion after thorough examination of the body that death had occurred some time early yesterday.

No marks of identification were on the trunk. The remains of two labels had been scraped off.

Dr. Wilson believed that the woman had been choked to death. The body was mutilated and the woman's teeth, which were false, were broken in two.

Police said the manner in which the body was placed in the trunk indicated that the job was not hastily done. The trunk was of metal, 22 inches long and 18 inches wide and 22 inches deep, yet the body was forced into so small a space as to permit the trunk lid to be put in place. A new clothes line was tied around the trunk.

POLICE SEEKING FRED JAMSHEN IN DENVER TODAY

DENVER, (AP)—The police today are seeking Fred Jamshen, formerly a church pastor, for questioning in connection with the finding of the body in a trunk at Ogden. Jamshen and his wife, a saleswoman for a department store, have been missing from their apartments since Thursday night.

The police visited the Jamshen apartment today and found blood on the carpet. Mrs. Jamshen's fellow workers in the department store said the description of the body tallied with her appearance.

AIRPLANES TO HOP OFF ON MONDAY

undertaking. Preparations have been made on the basis of completing the flight without consideration of a time record, and with the idea of learn as much as possible of the practical benefit of the effort to commercial aviation.

The only element of time considered in working out a theoretical schedule is that the flight must be completed by the latter part of August. This is due to the fact that part of the flight to be made after leaving Denmark must be conducted when the northern waters around the south-west end of Greenland are comparatively free from ice. After August it is expected those waters will become too thickly congested with ice to permit landings.

In preparation for the flight the officers selected to make it have gone through a course of training at Langley Field, Va., the course including navigation meteorology and actual flying in the type of plane to be used in the round-the-world flight. These world cruisers are designed as both land and water type, being readily converted by the interchangeable feature of wheels and pontoons.

The pontoons will be attached to the planes first at Seattle, Wash., and will remain until the flyers reach Japan. Then it is planned to substitute the landing gears, which will be used across Asia Minor and Europe as far as Hull, England. At the latter place the pontoons will again be attached to the plane and used until the flight reaches Montreal and possibly Keyport, N. J.

A feature of the preparations for the flight was the path-finding expeditions of two officers who went over what are regarded the most difficult portions of the route. Lieutenant Clarence E. Cramrine covered the span between Hull, England, and Montreal, paying particular attention to Greenland, where two landings must be made under the most difficult conditions. Lieutenant Clifford C. Nutt went to the Philippine Islands and thence to the Asiatic mainland to make preliminary arrangements through courtesies extended by the governments of Japan, China, Great Britain and France. The Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America gave valuable assistance to the officers in all preparations for the flight.

The proposed airway around the earth has been subdivided into six divisions as follows: First, beginning at Washington, D. C., and ending at Attu Island in the Aleutian group; second, ending at Nagasaki, Japan; third, ending at Calcutta, India; fourth, ending at Constantinople; fifth, ending at London; sixth, ending at Washington.

ten. Each division will have a main depot with one or more sub-depots for major items of supply. Gasoline, oil and small articles of supply have been placed at various points along the proposed route. The longest leg of the flight, according to the present plans, will be from Attu Islands to Paramushiro Island, in the northern part of the Kurile Islands group, a possession of Japan. Other long flights will be necessary over the Atlantic Ocean between the Faroe Islands and Iceland; between Iceland and Greenland; and between Greenland and northern Canada. The longest of these is about 700 miles.

and for completion of the government dam on Gila river Indian reservation, Arizona; \$450,000 for factory building and working capital at Leavenworth penitentiary; \$11,651,000 for pay of postal employees; \$85,000 for improvements on the Alaskan railroad, and \$245,000 to wipe out an operating deficit on the road.

Navy Fund Repealed

An amendment was adopted repealing an appropriation of \$5,500,000 made last year to permit the navy to increase the range elevation of turret guns on certain battleships. Chairman Madden, who offered the amendment, said the appropriation was authorized under misapprehension that Great Britain was making similar alterations on some of its capital ships.

Since then it has been established he said, that the navy department had erroneous foundation. None of the money, the house was told, has been expended.

The appropriation voted the coast guard would enable it to acquire 323 fast motor boats and to put into service 20 destroyers and two mine sweepers to be turned over by the navy. In the present Congress, the Republicans have a majority of 23 of the 45 state delegations in the House—two less than a clear majority, even including Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota.

The Democrats control 19 state delegations, including New York which they swing by the narrow majority of one.

Senatorially, the problem is no less serious. On its face, the Senate is composed of 51 Republicans, 43 Democrats and 2 Farmer-Labor members. But among the 51 Republicans are counted Brookhart, Norris, Ladd Frazier and La Follette, who are more independent.

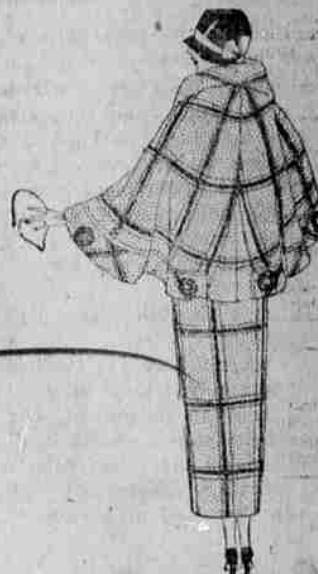
