HAWLEY FOR WHEAT BILL.
BARKER, Ore., in reply to tele-
grams sent the Oregon delegation
in congress by the Baker County
Wheatgrowers' association advocat-
ing support of the McNary-Haugen
farm relief bill now before
congress, W. C. Hawley, rep-
resentative from the first Ore-
gon district, declared:
"I intended to support the Mc-
Nary-Haugen bill unless adverse
influence change it so that you
would find it of no value and that
it would not offer any relief. After
attending a large mass meeting of
members of congress at which this
bill was fully explained by an ex-
pert of the United States depart-
ment of agriculture, Mr. Hawley
said: "I believe that if we can ac-
cure its passage in substantially its
present form, it will afford a great
measure of relief to the farming
population."

All other members of the Ore-
gon delegation have answered the
association's telegram in a similar
vein. Passage of the bill, which
would provide a \$100,000,000 sur-
plus farm products export corpora-
tion, seems imminent, said local
men.

kept free of snow by snow plows.

machines should not leave Pend-
ton or La Grande until about noon.

other related more in detail to the
story about an alleged attempt to
secure clemency for a relative of
Joe Meyer.

The statement making general
denial of the inference against
him was issued over the signature
of the attorney general.

SOUTH PACIFIC ISLAND HEARS OAKLAND STATION

OAKLAND, Cal., (INS)—Ma-
jor-General George S. Richardson,
Administrator of Western Samoa,
in a letter to KGO here, reports
that he listened to the entire pro-
gram as the guest of Quincy E.
Roberts, American Consul at Apia,
British Samoa, on January 12.

ing station that "Valima," the old
home of Robert Louis Stevenson,
now the residence of Major-Gen-
eral Richardson, has been named a
"listening station" of KGO. The
Governor has become a radio fan
and will equip his residence with a
radio set.

MADRID, (AP)—In spite of the
fact that motoring is popular in
Spain, only 4 women in the entire
country have up to the present
time, taken out licenses to drive
their own cars.
The reason for this scarcity of
female drivers probably is found
in the restrictions which govern the
issuing of licenses. A woman de-
siring to drive must submit a cer-
tificate of good conduct, another as
to her general health, sight and
hearing; and her birth certificate
giving the year in which she was
born. Girls under age must have
the written consent of their pa-
rents, and married women that of
their husbands.
