## AIRMEN MAY FINISH TRIP IN AUGUST

(Continued from page 1)

Britain probably will be second. Recent dispatches from London and elaborate preparations along a proposed route indicate the Empire's fliers will set out early next month.

Japan, according to press dispatches, plans also to attempt the flight soon.

There are rumors the Argentine Republic and others may enter the competition—the prize for which is the glory of having first encircled the globe by airplane.

### Pat Is Crooked.

Officials of the United States Army Air Service, who mapped out the trip, purposely chose a somewhat circuitous route in order that hops across the water will be as short as possible. To look on the map at the path they are scheduled to traverse, these officials appear to have succeeded admirably in choosing a nearly an all-land route as is physically possible. However, some of the jumps over water are far from short and, of course, are proportionately dangerous.

Preparations for the flight was started months ago, when engine and plane parts, fuel, supplies and food were "holed" at various points where the squadron will descend.

### To Advance U. S.

The avowed purpose of the flight, according to the United States Army Air Service, is to gain experience in distance flying, particularly as to supply problems; to circumnavigate the globe in the shortest practicable time; to demonstrate feasibility of a commercial around-the-world airway and to secure for the United States the first place of practical aviation, the honor of being the first nation to encircle the globe entirely by air.

A tentative schedule fixed by air officials probably cannot be executed, it is admitted. However, unless the flight is ended by the latter part of August it cannot be successful, they believe. This because the portion of the route embracing Denmark, Iceland, Greenland and Labrador must be covered when the waters in that region are ice-free, else landing will be perilous. Unless conditions are extraordinarily favorable no great efforts to make a time record will be made.

Elaborate preparations at home and abroad have been made. The officers selected were put through a rigorous "course of sprouts" at Langley Field, Va., where they studied navigation and meteorology, as applied to the route, supplemented by actual flying of the Douglas type plane.

The Douglas world cruisers were designed by Donald Douglas and constructed at the plant of the Douglas company, at Santa Monica, California. They are adapted for use on both land and sea, by detachable landing gears, interchangeable with pontoons. The fuselage is entirely of duralumin, the wings of wood and fabric, and the engine of the improved Liberty type.

### Planned Ahead.

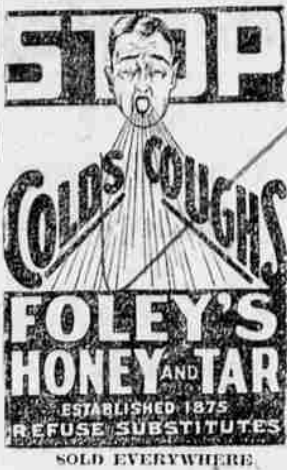
Four ships of this type are used. It is quite possible that an entirely new squadron of ships may be based at Santa Monica at the end of the flight.

Scattered from Sika to Shanghai and from Hong Kong to Hail are parts enough to assemble fifteen complete Liberty engines and sufficient material for 200 per cent replacement of the planes themselves. Extra sets of pontoons are cached at various points where water hops are necessary. There are

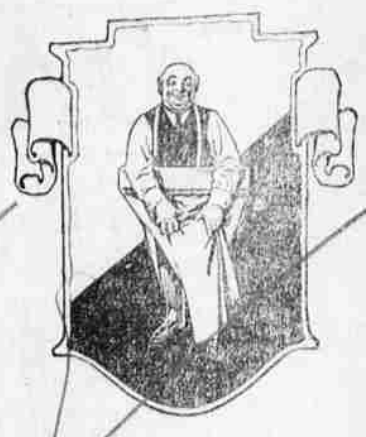
infinitely careful plans included arrangements made through the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce by which American corporations with foreign connections prepared letters of credit and other conveniences in advance.

Lieutenant Clarence E. Gurney and Lieutenant Clifford C. Nutt were in charge of the path-finding expedition for mapping out the route. Gurney covered the territory from Hull, England, to Montreal, Canada, while Nutt went to the Philippines, then to Asia and Europe. The United States Coast Guard attended to arrangements in the Alaskan region.

In addition to engine and plane parts, stored at various points, are large quantities of food and miscellaneous supplies shipped from the United States months ago and put away at convenient places.
