BURNS, RAU FIGHT DRAW LAST NIGHT

fight. Right here it ought to be stated that Burns is a first class sport or he would have stayed by the decision given him by the referee as he was entitled to do.

The only explanation which can be given for the whole affair is that Burney became confused momentarily and did not have his eye on Rau at the final count and so could not give the decision as the crowd saw it, but thought that Rau had been down ten seconds.

When interviewed Rau claims to have been knocked out for only about three seconds but took the full time in order to rest. He also denies that Burney helped him back into the ring. Another difference of opinion which should be cleared up is that Burns actually hit him in the body instead of in the left eye as it appeared afterwards. Rau was cut by the ropes when he fell and not by a blow from Burns.

On resuming the fight at the seventh round the fighters started even and agreed to fight the final four rounds for a decision. Rau came back strong and seemed untouched by the knockdown in the sixth. He led the fighting most of the time during the final minutes. He seemed to have the edge on Burns at this stage of the game but at the final gong Burney gave the only decision possible under the circumstances, calling it a draw.

The fight by ropes, giving Burney Burney's decision 72 to the final on each round, follows:
 Rau entered the ring first and waited several moments for Burns who had acted as a second to Danna in the semi-final.

1. Rau opens up fast and leads in the fighting. Burns on the defensive most of the round but lands good ones once or twice drawing blood from Rau's nose. Much close fighting and kidney punching in the clinches. Rau starts in early crowding Burns against the ropes Rau's hand.

2. Fighters start strong. Rau comes two wild ones. More in-fighting. Burns slips and falls on his feet again in an instant. Rau still on aggressive. Rau's round.

3. Rau lands left to head. Burns lands several short ones to body slowing Rau up a little. Rau left to jaw. Burns clinches at the gong. Rau still leading but Burns landed some good ones. Fighters cautioned about rabbit punches and kidney blows. Round even.

4. Rau leads again, forcing Burns to ropes. Burns opens up toward end and lands several good ones. Burns' round.

5. Burns leads. About an even exchange of right and lefts. Rau comes unlooked for Burns is cut under left eye. Round even.

6. Rau lands two lefts just as round opens. Burney tells fighters that as long as both are using sound punches and body blows in the clinches to go to it. Burns lands left against side of the ring knocking him through ropes. Rau takes two and on his feet. Round given Burns the decision.

7. Fighters start even after some altercation. Rau seems fresher than Burns in spite of knockdown. Burns on defensive most of the time. Round even.

8. Rau still leading with Burns on defensive. Rau lands right to body. Burns hanging on and clinching. Round even.

9. Burns leads. Rau delivers left to face. Good exchange of left and right. Burns seems weaker. Rau lands fast right just at gong. Round even.

10. Much slugging at start. Rau still leading. Burns left jaw. Burns still clinching toward the end. Burns' right eye is cut near end. Rau land right and left. Round even.

The main part of the evening was declared absolutely the best yet in the season by the fans, who were well satisfied.

The semi-final, Danna vs. Kelley Long was a slaughter. Danna had the edge all the way through, completely outclassing Long. Long seemed lost but took an awful punishment and was game to the last.

Darden said his connection with Teapot Dome arose through his association with the Campion family in Colorado, which had large interests in the west. The late John P. Campion, Robert Taylor and himself acquired 249 acres in episodes by admitting that he had paid at least \$5000 collected from various drug companies to Howard Mannington, a friend of the attorney general, for the purpose of keeping certain liquor cases "out of court."

WASHINGTON (AP)—A constitutional amendment providing that newly elected presidents take their office in January following the election was approved Tuesday by the senate. In addition to advancing the inauguration day to the third Monday in January, new congresses would meet regularly in January instead of the December following.
