Shortly before 10 o'clock complete returns to newspapers showed McAdoo had 214 votes in the Democratic convention, nine more than the necessary majority to insure election of the Georgia delegation of 28 votes to the national convention in New York.

## COOLIDGE RETAINS LEAD IN NORTH DAKOTA

FARGO, N. D. (AP)—Coolidge's lead in the primaries was increased by returns today. In 2659 precincts he received 46,156 votes, La Follette 24,645, and Johnson 24,989.

FARGO, N. D. (By the Associated Press)—Probable endorsement of Calvin Coolidge for the republican presidential nomination in Tuesday's state-wide primary in North Dakota, was indicated on the basis of unofficial returns here.

These returns, which were from 1217 of the state's 2659 precincts, gave the president a 15,000 plurality and put Senator Robert M. La Follette in second place, a few votes ahead of Senator Hiram M. Johnson, who had been runner-up since introduction of returns began.

Every county in the state was represented in these returns which gave the president 27,287 votes, as compared to 22,287 for La Follette and 22,272 for Johnson.

They were the last returns available when tabulation ceased for the night.

This comparison, assuming no serious error will be found in the unofficial tabulations, seemed to insure the president's endorsement, as his margin was sufficient to allow for a material increase in the ratio against him in unreported returns from anti-Coolidge counties. In the reported precincts the republican vote totalled 81,842, and

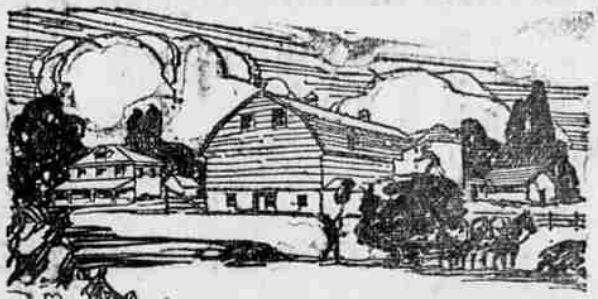
