'PUTTING ON' LAST TOUCHES

W. H. Bohnenkamp company are putting the finishing touches to their new warehouse and garage building this week and will soon have it ready for use. Its completion will provide the company with adequate quarters to take care of its garage and implement business and in addition provides a number of new store and shop buildings for other purposes.

A number of the old and established business firms of La Grande will find quarters in the new building. Numbered among these are Nate Zweifel, with a plumbing and heating shop, together with farm lighting plants, gasoline engines and other farm and home equipment. Charles Runyan will locate his sign shop there after April 1. Fred Burgess of the Exide Battery station is now located in his new shop and J. P. Strong, La Grande's pioneer vulcanizer and tire repair man and George Payer, the car painter, also have new shops in the new building. One shop is still vacant although several applications are in for it.

Considerable alterations have also been made to the old building to better adapt it for the needs of the company. Chief among these are the addition of a new salesroom on the corner of Jefferson and Elm streets, the refitting of the main garage room and the moving of the shop from the old building into the new one with a considerable increase in the size of it. The room that shop occupied will be used for the parts storeroom for farm machine and

car extras. The implement and repair department will be in charge of H. O. Hagen. Mr. Hagen has recently moved here from North Dakota and has had wide experience in the implement business. G. D. Ross, of La Grande will assist Chase Bohnenkamp with the car sales.

The additional quarters have also provided the means of the company entering the wholesale field on several lines which they have been considering for some time. Carload orders of commodities, including pipe, powder, nails, bar iron and blacksmith coal which will be distributed from this point.

In speaking of the new improvements, Chase Bohnenkamp, manager of the company, said that it is his idea that La Grande and the business firms of La Grande are in line for a period of expansion and prosperity and that the way to enjoy it the most is to get ready for it now. That this belief is shared by others is shown by the ready demand for business locations in this city.
