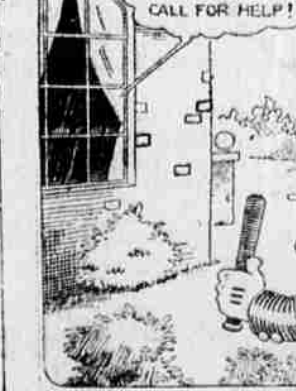

one ton for the world production of wool for 1923, is approximately 42,000,000 pounds short of 1922, according to figures made available today (March 4, 1924) by the department of Commerce. This decrease is attributed to the reduction in the Australian clip, estimated at 120,000,000 pounds.

The 1922 Oregon wool production is estimated at about 14,000,000 pounds, valued at \$4,452,000. Annual production as reported by the census for 1923 was 330,473 pounds. The 1922 production was probably about 350,000 pounds, value about \$122,500.

The total number in Union County is estimated at 17,000 head of sheep, value \$170,000.00 and a total amount of wool of 120,000 pounds, value \$54,000.00 for 1923.

Beef Cattle.
The report of the U. S. Department of Agriculture for January 1, 1923 indicates 14,500 beef cattle in Union County. It was the judgment of the conference that on January 1st, 1924, the number was about 10,000 and that there was now not enough cattle to utilize all the feed available.

No general increase is recommended although enough cattle should be kept to use the feed and to stand for other purposes. It is recognized that cattle have been fed at a loss during recent years.

Mr. James Wilson, the county's most extensive feeder stated that his cattle getting 40 lbs. of hay and 5 of rolled barley were gaining 1 and 1/2 lbs. per day and that he had to have a margin of 12 cents a month. He stated that of the 40 lbs. of hay fed a considerable proportion was refused by the fattening steers.

Gains made by the Union Experiment Station were slightly better than Mr. Wilson's. On hay alone the gain was one pound per day and on hay and shag, 1 and 1/2 to 2 and 1/2. Figures prepared by the Oregon Agricultural College on the east of raising cattle in the Blue Mountain section of Oregon showed that the average cattleman fed one ton of hay per head, and was using about 3 acres of devoted land in addition to maintain range or forest. The cut crop of winter wheat estimated at 85 per cent and the annual losses at 5 per cent. On this basis a herd of 100 head of cattle would produce each year 25 head of saleable cattle half two year old steers and half two year cows.

While beef prices are discouraging better prices are hoped for in the future and much feed now used for beef would have no other use, so any further decrease in our beef herds would be undesirable selling cattle at low prices and buying sheep at high prices is almost undesirable.

MEMORIAL FOR HARDING IDEA OF S. A. MILLER

WALLA WALLA, (Special)—The building of a view house on the top of the Blue Mountains at Meacham, Ore., as a memorial to President Harding is a suggestion which has been made by S. A. Miller of Milton-Freewater and is meeting with much approval among friends and backers of the Oregon Trail according to word received here.

The idea was first mentioned by Mr. Miller to A. P. Alexander of this city who is known as the father of the Oregon Trail movement.
