

REPUBLICANS MARKING TIME

G. O. P. Followers in Iowa Standing Still, Pending Brookhart's Wishes.

DES MOINES, Ia. (AP) — The contest for delegates to the Republican convention from Iowa has developed a condition that has had no recent parallel in the modern political history of the state because of the attitude of United States Senator Brookhart. He is recognized as strong in his home state and all political sides concede that he will have a great influence on the delegation. But thus far Senator Brookhart has not indicated any leaning toward any of the announced Presidential candidates.

At the county conventions the delegates were instructed to vote for President Coolidge at the Cleveland convention. In the meantime, the state is seething with politics of a statewide nature. Brookhart is seeking re-election to a full term and has an opponent former Congressman Burton E. Sweet, who ran fifth in a six-man contest when Senator Brookhart received the Republican nomination to fill the seat made vacant by the resignation of Senator W. S. Kenyon in 1922. The primary comes on June 2.

Mr. Sweet has been campaigning in the state for the last six months and is showing signs of fulfilling the most strenuous campaign ever conducted by a candidate for U. S. senator. A third candidate for the senatorial nomination is Vernon Lee Warner, of Painesville, Ia., described on his cards as a "traveler and dilettante." He also described himself as a stockman and Princeton Graduate.

Congressman Sweet in opening his campaign sometime ago declared the issue between Senator Brookhart and himself was "Radicalism against Progressivism."

The Republican gubernatorial contest has developed into something of a free-for-all affair, for no less than six candidates already have signified their intention of running for the nomination. They include J. H. Anderson of Thompson, speaker of the house of representatives; A. J. Banks of Montour, leader of the Taxpayers' League and a "dirt farmer" candidate; W. J. Rutbank of Waterloo, treasurer of state; J. D. Buser of Conesville, state senator from Muscatine and Louisa counties; John Hammond of Britt, lieutenant governor; and Glenn C. Haynes, auditor of the state.

Each of the six candidates claims a fairly well defined group of supporters and in none of the six does the 25 per cent of the total primary vote required by Iowa primary law to nominate a candidate, the nomination must be made in convention and will narrow down to the task of delegate-getting.

Then there are numerous candidates for lieutenant governor, state treasurer and state auditor, but as yet no candidates have appeared to contest for the offices of secretary of state, attorney general or secretary of agriculture, except the present incumbents.

All of Iowa's present congressmen have taken out papers for re-nomination, but several will have contests on their hands in the primary.

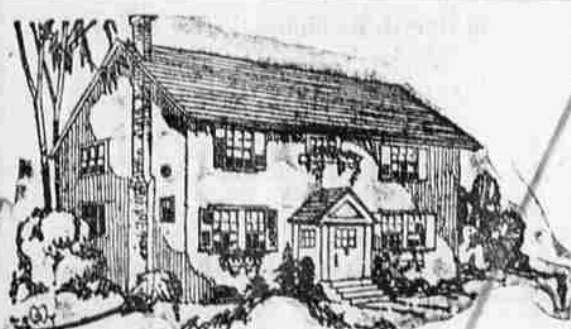
