Hints for the Housewife

DELICIOUS COFFEE.
The most delicious results are obtained by using fresh roasted coffee, freshly ground, through which water of a temperature just below the boiling point is dripped for not more than two minutes.

The rules to be followed to attain this most desired result are not hard to remember.

1. See that the coffee is not ground too coarse.
2. A fine grind yields a richer flavor than a coarse grind because of the more rapid and complete solution of the flavoring substance.
3. Allow at least a tablespoonful of ground coffee to a cup of water.
4. The exact proportion depends upon the kind of coffee used and can be determined only by individual taste. In measuring the water always allow an extra cup to take care of evaporation.
5. Be sure the water boils; then pour it over the freshly ground coffee.

Many types of coffee pots are provided with special perforated containers for the freshly ground coffee. By means of these perforations the hot water drips slowly through the coffee. By pouring at the boiling point, the water in contact with the coffee falls to just the temperature needed to extract the greatest amount of flavor and aroma. If a coffee drip bag is used, be sure it is kept clean and sweet.

The dripping process should not last longer than two minutes. Long dripping at a lower temperature increases the bitter taste and decreases the flavor and aroma.

5. Serve at once.
6. Adding coffee and ruin it. If you must be a delay in serving, keep the coffee piping hot, but do not let it boil.
7. Do not use the ground coffee a second time.

Coffee once used has given up its aroma and flavor to the beverage.

There is nothing of any value left in the grounds.

Scour the coffee pot.

It is necessary to have the utmost clean. Remnants of the old grounds will weaken the freshly ground coffee.

These are the simple rules for a better cup of coffee—prayer by science and well worth a trial.

Portland, Ore. (Special).—American Legion, Department of Oregon.

For the purpose of increasing a spirit of legion betterment among the posts of the legion in Oregon, the state department offers to posts that turn in a membership equal or in excess of that for last year, a certificate of merit for meritorious service. At the first of the year some of the posts had already qualified. Twenty-eight posts have now completed their requirement and will be presented with the certificates at the annual state convention of the organization to be held in Portland next June. These posts are located at the following cities: Ashland, Astoria, Baker, Brownsville, Brighton, Cottage Grove, Eugene, Imbler, La Grande, Malilla, Monroe, Moro, Medford, Mililla, Montrose, Moro, Ontario, Oregon City, Prineville, Roseburg, Salem, Seaside, Silverton, Sheridan, Springfield, St. Helens, Tillamook and Westfall.

The mayor of Roseburg has requested the assistance of the local post of the American Legion in a campaign to beautify the city. The city has organized a city beautiful commission and the American Legion will be represented. The movement has received the hearty endorsement of Roseburg legionnaires who have pledged their support. Legionnaire Walter Fisher heads the new commission.

The March issue of the Pacific Legion, official publication of the American Legion in Oregon, closes the fifth year of the existence of that publication, which has developed into what is generally conceded to be the greatest veteran magazine west of New York. In interest, appearance and service, it is in the top rank of legion publications of the country, though depending for support on a comparatively sparsely settled state. Since its first issue as the state publication of the Legion in America, the Pacific Legion has been dedicated to the cause of Americanism and service. It is perhaps the most bitter enemy of the radical element in the northwest now being published. It is more than an organ of the American Legion expression, being an active factor with the legion in spreading the gospel of community service as well as service to "hobbies" of the world war. Its editorial policy is controlled by and it is published through arrangement with the
