of Oregon which most appealed in my talks was its openness and the opportunity it afforded for a natural life close to nature. Once in closing I used the figure of vision shining out of the Columbia—a mother stretching open her arms in welcome and refer to the congested Atlantic districts. The appeal of that figure to the crowded east was so tremendous that I ever employed it after that.

Mrs. Barrett first received nationwide recognition when during the war she was the cause of bringing the first carload of Montana wheat down the Columbia to the Pacific for shipment. Thousands of dollars worth of business has come to Oregon in the wake of this first car.

In April, 1922, she was elected city manager of Warrenton—the first woman in the country to hold such a position. Her accomplishments there have included the cleaning up of Warrenton and the bringing out growing industries with large payrolls to the city. Her success led the people of Warrenton to select her as Skipperman channel representative at Washington.

Six weeks in Washington. She left for the nation's capital the first day of the year and during the time she was gone visited many cities along the route, always speaking on Oregon and its possibilities. Her six weeks in Washington saw her spending three hours every morning at the capitol building and delivering at least two speeches every day. Among organizations she addressed were the International Association of Art and Letters, the American Women's Press club, the Washington Women's City club and the daughters of the American Revolution. Her work at the capitol was in behalf of not only the Warrenton channel but also for Oregon roads, the naval base, and the Tongue Point project.

"The Oregon enterprise had no need of me," however," declared Mrs. Barrett. "That is the Baker irrigation project. It was most efficiently and adequately handled by its representatives."

Mrs. Barrett's talks were devoted to all of Oregon. Her broadcasts over radio as well as some of her speeches to groups dealt with the Oregon Trail. Starting at the Idaho boundary she would take her listeners through the cattle and sheep lands, between wheat ranches, point out to them the beauties of the Grande Ronde valley, ascend with them the Blue mountains and from these lead them down to the Columbia river a glimpse and the coast.

"The Oregon publicity could have continued indefinitely if my money hadn't run out," says Mrs. Barrett. "I am a real estate dealer, spent \$1200 of her own money in addition to the \$2000 which Warrenton had allowed her. I stayed until I had spent everything but my car fare home—talking Oregon all the time."

Asked how she was successful in "breaking into print" in the city where hundreds are so trying in vain, Mrs. Barrett replied, "At first there was the novelty of my being city manager. Then I simply told the newspaper men and women that I wasn't looking for pay, and didn't want publicity for myself, but for my state. They responded wholeheartedly. A 'midnight tea' that I started in order to give them a chance to question me when their working hours were over used to be attended by a dozen or so every evening."

Mrs. Barrett has been busy speaking before Oregon organizations since returning home the first of the month. The latter part of this work she will address the Business Men's club of Portland. She will then go back to Warrenton where she will resume her work and prepare her city to handle the commerce of the state she has been boosting.

COOKING BILL \$3.42 A MONTH

Mrs. Charles Playle receives high honors at Hotpoint Electric Cooking Classes.

Mrs. Charles Playle received high honors at the Hotpoint electric cooking classes, at which the new Hotpoint electric ranges were demonstrated last week in the Hotel Sommer sample rooms, where she estimated the average electric cooking bill for the month of February in La Grande to be \$3.42. This was the exact average of all the bills. Mrs. Evelyn Hearnshaw estimated \$3.43 losing out by one cent, but tied with Mrs. Grace E. Mollitor on the estimate for the amount of electrical current used during the five days of cooking done by Miss Hearnshaw at the cooking classes. Both these ladies estimated 29 kilowatt hours, the exact amount the meter registered.

Much interest was displayed in the cooking classes and girls of high school age are now contesting in a 500-word essay contest on the advantages of electric cooking for a Hotpoint prize. The offer is open to all, essays being due at the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company office not later than March 21.

Lloyd, "Lutine Bell" Sounds. Twice for Chip Thought Lost LONDON. (AP) — Lloyd Underwriters have had the unusual experience of hearing the famous "Lutine Bell" twice in three days. This bell was taken from the war ship "Lutine" in 1799 and is used to announce the loss or arrival of overdue vessels.

Two strokes of the bell the other day was followed by an announcement that the overdue vessel "Jahan" on which re-insurances had been paid, had arrived in London. Two days later the room heard two strokes of the bell again and also heard much to its amazement that the bark "Herald" had reached Chingwangtao, China, after being two months overdue. Re-insurances up to 75 guineas per 100 pounds had been taken out on the "Herald," which was last reported at Haiti, Sumatra, in October, and it is very rare that a vessel arrives after such a high insurance rate has been paid.
