## NEW 'METEOR' AMBULANCE IN

### L. L. Snodgrass Drives Recently - Purchased Car in From Portland This Morning.

Arriving in La Grande this morning at 2 o'clock with the new Meteor ambulance which was at once put into service by the Snodgrass & Zimmerman undertaking company, L. L. Snodgrass stated that made from snow on the top of the mountain his drive from Portland to La Grande in the new ambulance had been very satisfactory.

The new Meteor is the latest creation in the ambulance line. It weighs 4750 pounds, is pear shaped with narrow top. The wheels are of leafless plates and are mounted on the axle from either side through very large double doors, thus avoiding crowding or cramping of patient that is being conveyed. Its interior is finished in a high grade leather and folding seats for attendants are stationed on the right side of the car.

The Meteor has a 70-horsepower engine, is fitted with 24x7 Firestone balloon tires, has regulation ambulance whistles and bell. This makes the second ambulance which is now in service by the Snodgrass & Zimmerman company.

Now start: Count 1 and swing the broom in a long easy stroke, swaying shoulders in time, your head erect. Count 2 and stop right foot across left.
