Thousands Rush to New Diamond Fields

JOHANNESBURG, (INS)—Some and stories reminiscent of the first diamond rushes are reported from Stompos, where a large diamond field was recently discovered.

Ten thousand diggers have already arrived, it is stated, while hundreds more, including many blacks, are streaming in from all sides daily.

EARTH SHOCKS ROCK HAWAII

Japanese and Filipino Residents Are Terrorized by Series of Tremors Near Hilo.

HILO, Hawaii, (AP)—Partly shocks which began Monday in the Hilo district near the famous Kilauea volcano, were continuing Wednesday afternoon according to reports from Honolulu and terrorized Japanese and Filipino residents are said to have been fleeing from the region.

The quakes, which have been occurring at brief intervals, are described as moderate and have opened up several cracks across the roads. Some of these cracks are but few feet deep extending towards the sea. One fissure extends for a quarter of a mile into the jungle.

All telephone lines are down and the only communication is via the post.

Thirty tremors were recorded by the Hilo seismograph Tuesday night.

tion on two farms in Contra Costa county several weeks ago after all the diseased herds in the county had been killed, and providing identification. The new "stamp-out" procedure, the virulence of the virus which causes foot and mouth disease, State and federal veterinarians are working rapidly in lifting infected and exposed herds as fast as they can be found, and the disinfecting process comes down after clean up with modern equipment for "mopping-up" the infection. No cases of the disease have been found outside of the quarantined area, composed of 14 counties.

Restocking Now Permitted. Officials have made the regulations as lenient as possible without sacrificing public safety.

The department considers it unfortunate that the authorities of certain Western states have thought it necessary to place drastic restrictions on the movement from California of commodities which have been known to carry infection. The president has sent telegrams to the governors of a number of western states asking that a conference be held for the purpose of making quarantine more reasonable while at the same time providing against the spread of the disease.

gilled. "There is, finally, no doubt, new inspirations were advanced," he continued, "as to what steps should be taken to cripple the government of the United States and create the columns that support it."

It may fairly be inferred that one step in this direction was to capture, by deceit and duress, as many members of the senate of the United States as possible and to spread throughout Washington city and in the cloak rooms of congress a poison gas as deadly as that which sapped and destroyed brave soldiers in the late war.

"This will not permit me to give on this occasion the details of the various plans and efforts undertaken to influence the senate as a body and individual members thereof. When the country is willing to help and in condition to comprehend it, the whole story will be made known. For protection of innocent persons much of it must now be withheld."
