Queensland a Cotton Land Her Premier Tells England

MANCHESTER, Eng. (AP)—Queensland's premier, E. C. Theodore, told a meeting of business men here that Queensland had millions of acres of land suitable for cotton production, and that Australia is free from those terrible pests which have made such vast tracts in the prosperity of cotton growing in other countries.

In 1919 there were 72 acres under cotton cultivation in Queensland which yielded 37,000 pounds of seed cotton. This year the acreage was 15,000 and the yield 500,000 pounds. In 1922 there were 1,600 growers and in 1923 there were 2,200, 45,000 acres of the premier said, was and would
