Beauty Hints

THE VERY YOUNG PERSON
We don't like to call her a flapper, because the word seems to us to have gone out of style along with the frilly bob, and the tummy little hats perched over our ears, although names may change the fact remains the same, and that very vivid and entrancing young person of the younger generation is always with us, and a very worthwhile sort, too, in spite of the fulminations of authors and playwrights.

All her faults are those of over-enthusiasm, and nowhere is this more true than in the realm of cosmetics. Although the young girl needs less cosmetics than her older sisters, she nearly always uses twice as much, and thereby covers up the vivacity and glow of youth. Of course even young maidens need powder to avoid the suspicion of a "baby nose," and for the beneficial effects that a good powder has on the skin, but they can be a little more critical about its use than their sometimes are. Girls are usually in a hurry, to get "showtown," to go to the dressmaker, or the milliner or to their dearest friend, or whatever. Very often they select a powder just full of powder and dab it on hastily, make a correspondingly heavy dab of the rouge pot, and apply both in a corresponding sense of perfection, which is hardly borne out by the appearance they present. Moreover they are somewhat given to the use of dead white powder, whether it is becoming to the color of their skin or not. With the addition of a large amount of bright lipstick, the effect is, to say the least, unbecoming.

As a matter of fact, it is now generally conceded that white powder is passe, and the warm, shades are more becoming to even fair skins. One reason for this is the vogue for out of door effects demanding Peach or Peach and Cream type of face powders which combine soft tan and pinkish tones blending with the warm skin of the modern girl. The dark, soot, black haired maiden will define in Peach and Cream, with a touch

of Ashes of Roses rouge, which gives a color like the petals of the red rose. Just a touch enough to bring out the sparkle in her eyes. If her own lips are naturally colorful she may let well enough alone, or use a colorless lipstick merely for keeping the lips soft and smooth. If she feels the need of accentuation let her first be sure that her lips are of the kind that brings the natural color to the lips, and then if she does use the lipstick, let her take her time and apply it carefully. Nothing is more unbecoming on a youthful face than the hard, artificial outline of poorly made-up lips. And don't succumb to the lure of beaded eyelashes and other sophisticated forms of make-up. It is not sanctioned by good form and has not even the excuse of becomingness.

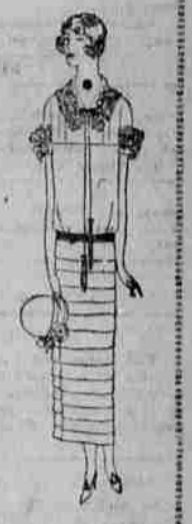

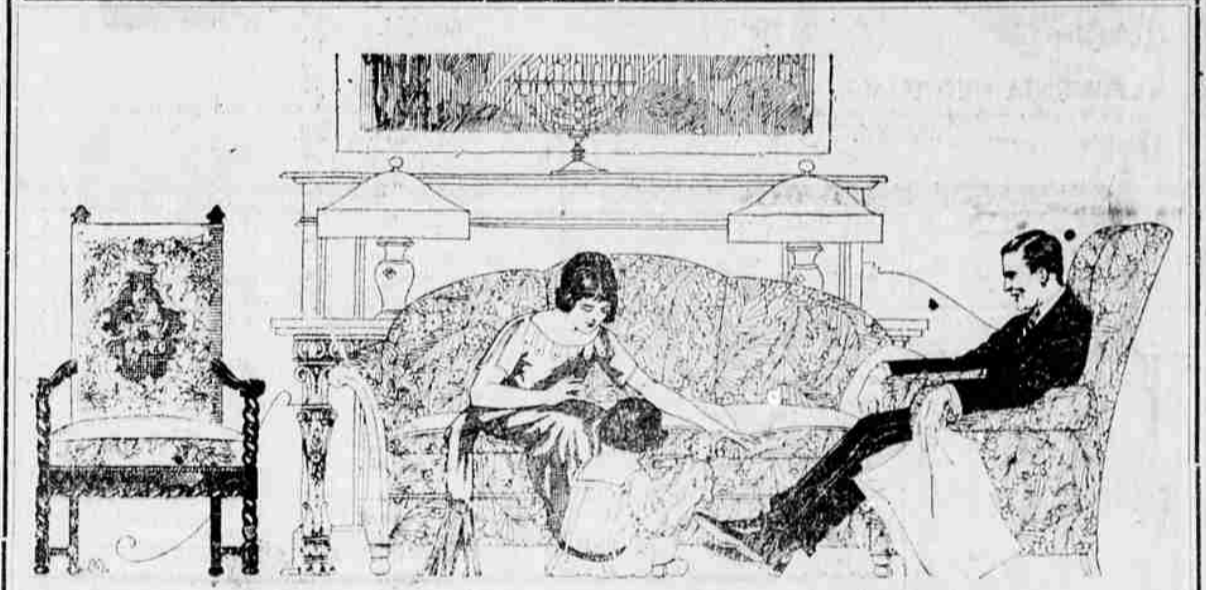
