Colorums in northeastern Mindanao and some of the other southern Philippine Islands have of late been on the warpath against the government authorities, having killed forty constabulary soldiers and necessitated sending of the United States garrison to help restore order.

The Manila Colorums, however, deny they contemplate violence and have assured Brigadier General Crane through their leaders, they will remain peaceful.

Therefore, By Authority of law vested in said State Game Commission of the State of Oregon, under section 8, Chapter 65, Oregon Laws of 1921, notice is hereby given that the waters of said Mill Creek and the tributaries thereof, situated and described above, are closed from the 15th day of April, 1924, to the 30th day of November, 1924.

And it is and shall be unlawful for any person whomsoever to fish or angle for, take or kill, in any manner, any trout or other fish in the waters of the above described Mill Creek or tributaries thereof. Any person violating this order will be prosecuted as by statute provided.
