### LA GRANDE IS MEET FAVORITE

Blue and White Athletes Expected to Take the Union County Track Honors Saturday.

By Saturday evening the much cherished county laurels will rest upon the brows of athletes from some school in Union county after the track meet which is to be held at Union on that day.

Practically every school in Union county will be represented either in the grade school events or the high school competitions. In the forenoon before the meet the fastest typists and shorthand students from the various student bodies will compete for honors.

Cocher MacTavish of La Grande will take 21 men who will participate in the regular track meet. He lists Price, Steinbeck, Stout, Glass, Lynch, Jacobson, McCall, McKinnon, Zimmerman, Zundel, Jensen, Brown, Walsinger, Funk, Kerr, Williams, Oker, Stager, Harnden, Hughes and Hradley as the lucky ones.

"The boys are getting better every week," says MacTavish. Starting with almost a green squad at the beginning of the season it has taken a little time to teach the youngsters the rudiments of the game but the entire squad is in better shape now than at any time so far this season.

It is expected that Sherwood who was ineligible for last week's meeting with Poudreton will be able to enter the lists next Saturday. If so he will strengthen La Grande's team in several places. He is strongest in the broad jump and hurdles and also heaves the shot some little distance.

### PRINTER ERRED, SO GOLF TILT'S DATE IS ALTERED

NEW YORK (INS)—The United States Golf association has decided it is cheaper to change the date of the twenty-eighth annual national open golf championship than it is to have the programs printed over again.

Dates for play were originally fixed for Wednesday and Thursday June 4 and 5, but the printer, evidently suffering with hypermetropia, set it up for Thursday and Friday, June 5 and 6—and so it will remain.

An error of a week also was made in the national championship date last fall at Plover, Wis. Maxwell Marston, the ultimate winner, didn't hear of the slipup, so was on hand a week earlier.

**"Strangler" Lewis Is Winner Over Romano**  
CHICAGO (AP)—Pattee here protected "Strangler" Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, when several thousand spectators, enraged by referee Charles Lavigne's decision giving Lewis his second fall over Mike Romano, Italian challenger, showed the champion and referee with open bottles and attempted to rush into the ring.

Lewis won the first fall in 4:23 with a toe kick and Romano took the second in 19:20 after applying 20 successive headlocks. Lavigne awarded the deciding fall to Lewis in 2:10 on a double wrist lock. Romano's manager claimed his protégé had not been pinned to the mat and started a fist fight with the referee.

### Norwegians Continue Efforts To Discover Great Coal Strata

OSLHISTANIA, (AP)—The investigations which were commenced last year by the Norwegian Fishery Department to discover whereabouts of the great coal strata are to be continued this summer. Further areas about Spitzbergen will be subjected to examination and in addition to the official expedition it is probable that more than one expedition will be undertaken as a result of municipal or private initiatives.
