## The Garden

Get the match off the bath basin, stir the soil with a hand cultivator and scatter among seeds such as burdock, poppy, sweet alyssum, or California poppies to combat and hide the daisy hawk.

Watch the hot beds and cold frames. This is the trying time when an occasional warm day and a number of cold ones make it difficult to regulate, but give the young plants all the air they can stand. They need it to toughen up for moving day.

Outdoor catalogues, carnations, pansies, geraniums, petunias, lettuces, pineapples, beets, smooth peas, and light rain won't mind a few belated snowstorms or frosts. Get the seed in.

Treat seed potatoes with a formalin solution (see each) one pint of commercial formaldehyde to 40 gallons of water. This will prevent rot and scab on the tubers.

It is time to plant the new cabbage, cauliflower, and eggplant or give it some nitrate and dig it over lightly.

Keep a-weed on the current bushes and other harbor of plant lice and spray with nicotine to prevent the bugs from getting into the vegetable garden. You can't start a mow-thru to soon when the leaves begin to unfold.

Fill any holes in the lawn and scatter grass seed over them.

There is still time to start tomatoes, peppers, egg plants and cucumbers in the hotbed for the summer crop. You need a succession in tomatoes.

You can start bush beans in peat pots or dirt bands at any time. Many plants can be set into the ground. Petunias delight in cool weather.

Now cultivate, mulch, sow and let tender annuals in the cold frame now. Petunias will do well with this treatment.

Don't hesitate to transplant to nasturtium, eggplants or pepper into boxes or pots if they are crowding. They will be better plants for it and will be worth next if not next if crowded into spacings.

This is a good time to start a herb bed in a convenient corner. Sow scallions, thyme, marjoram, sage, dill, and other pot herbs now or set out plants from the seedman.

Look over perennials planted from seed last fall and if they have heaved out of the ground gently push them into the soil and fill in around them timely.
