MAN FINALLY YIELDS POWER

Masculine Element Giving After Forty Million Years of Ruling.

(By F. A. Wray.) LONDON, (INS)—Lord Birkenhead, chief anti-feminist in Britain, has been compelled by the women to give his views on "The Twentieth Century of Man." The occasion was the dinner of the Suffragist club of Greater London. Birkenhead did his part nobly. "I have spent," he said, "many years of my life in attempting to prevent women getting into the House of Commons. If I could drive them out today I certainly would do so. At any rate I, and no other man, have been successful in keeping them out of the House of Lords. But unfortunately men are now obliged to confess themselves in a state of great inferiority. I do not know any department in which men still continue their complete superiority except in cooking and women's fashions. "Still, as a man who, in my time, has taken great pride over his sex, believing that mentally, intellectually and physically they were superior to women, I have now, on behalf of my sex, to advocate all claims over the female sex, which we have hitherto successfully maintained for over forty million years."

"MESSIAH" TO BE SUNG AT PAGEANT AT WALLA WALLA

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (Special)—Singing of the Hallelujah chorus from the "Messiah," by a chorus of 800 voices, will be one of the outstanding features of the "Walla Walla Pageant," "How the West Was Won," to be staged here May 28 and 29. Assembling of a chorus of such size has been one of the most difficult tasks attending the pageant preparation, but the singers have all been recruited from Walla Walla, Prescott and Wallburg, Wash., and Milton, Free-water and Weston, Ore. A Junior chorus of 600 voices, which will sing the opening chorus of the pageant, and arrangements will be played by the 67-piece Walla Walla symphony orchestra. The pageant, to be presented for the second time with a cast of 3200, will review 75 years of history of the Pacific Northwest.

NORWAY ERAND BOYS IN STRIKE FOR HOLIDAY PAY

CHRISTIANIA, (INS)—The world's first strike of errand boys is threatened in this city. The boys have already formed themselves into a union. Printed circulars have been issued by the "committee" and freely distributed throughout the city urging their grievances and urging their employers to abstain from any work that might be of a strike-breaking character. Holidays with full pay are demanded, and among other features of the Christiania situation is a proposed parade of the errand boys accompanied by a boys' band thru the principal streets of the city.

P. 2 to each one hundred (100) parts of water and their shoes and shearing equipment to official disinfection. Certificate of disinfection shall be required of all farm laborers coming from California.
