LUMBER TRADE GAINING NOW

The lumber trade has continued to gain in activity, as a result of good weather eliminating inhibiting factors. The American Lumbermen's Association, Commission in active organization the Pacific coast region and the South, and a material upturning has been noticeable in the West, where the drying up of the roads has benefited country trade. Important northern markets, however, remain unacceptably quiet, holding in some of these not having developed on the west coast. Retailers are exceedingly conservative and consequently trade is slow. The trade from other sections has been of fair and gradually increasing volume, the southern pine market has been affected by the comparatively dullness in the North. Prices are slightly lower than a fortnight ago, but no actual weakness is apparent.

The larger mills have enjoyed good business and have been shipping heavily, as their stocks are still liberal. There also no suggestion for new business, holding firmly to their price lines. The prospects will be returned to successful holders.
