

ARMY LIFE TO ATTRACT BOYS

Thousands of Lads Will Attend the C. M. T. C. This Season.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (INS) — Have you noticed wood fires at night? Have you heard the high-toned whistles? Are you quick to read the notes of the night? You must follow with the others, for the young men's feet are turning.

To the camps of proved desire and known delight.

When Kipling wrote that there weren't any citizens' military training camps, he was wrong. The youth is turning to the patriotic heartstrings of about thirty thousand American boys this spring.

With appropriations for training a quota of 25,000 youths at 27 training camps across the country from Camp Lewis, Washington, to Fort Buchanan, Arizona, already half of that number has been enrolled up to April 15, when the latest report was issued, and officials in Washington are confident the number of applicants will go over the quota for the first time.

This summer's camps will be the fourth series of Citizens' Military Training camps held in the United States. The idea originated with Theodore Roosevelt and like a rolling snowball has gathered followers each season until now the camps are packed in every state by the leading men and women of the community and of the nation.

ALL OVER U. S.

There will be one camp of our country's youth at each of the 27 points in the United States and one in Puerto Rico, while two camps will be held at Plattsburgh, N. Y., on account of the large number of applicants in the Second Corps area.

The First Corps area will train 2,000 men at Camp Devens, Mass., and Fort Adams, R. I., from August 1 to 20.

The Second Corps area will train 2,000 men at Fort Belvoir, Ill., from July 1 to 20 and from August 1 to 20.

The Third Corps area will train 2,000 men at Camp Meade, Md., and Fort Monmouth, N. J., from July 1 to 20 and from August 1 to 20.

The Fourth Corps area will train 2,000 men at Fort Belvoir, Ill., from July 1 to 20 and from August 1 to 20.

MADISON HALL HISTORIC ONE

Democrats to Name Candidate in Building of Varied and Interesting History.

NEW YORK (AP) — Madison Square Garden, where the National Democratic convention will meet in June, always has been a place of crowds, from the days of the civil war period when it was the metropolitan terminal for a great railway, on through the phase of its transformation into a glitzy "night-bird" 21 years ago, until the present.

Always its career has been spectacular, crowds have poured through its portals to attend the arrival of pennant-carrying teams in those when railroads were making historic speed records. Grand opera stars have made their debuts there, boxers and wrestlers have gained and lost championships, and day bicyclists have pedaled their weary courses, bronchos have been busted, elephants have trumpeted and elephants have cavorted, flower shows have blossomed, and politicians have thundered under its rafters.

Adding history to its varied career, the Garden Tower, which wears its weatherbeaten facade above the roof of the structure, was the scene in 1906 of a sensational murder, the killing of the architect of Madison Square Garden, Stanford White, at the hand of Harry K. Thaw.

Before it quit the work-day world to enter the realm of pleasure, the garden was the New York New Haven & Hartford railroad's central station in this city. Then P. T. Barnum, whose huge museums, traveling circuses and operas were bringing big money to the building structure, turned the "entertainment and exhibition" purposes. In 1874, he named it "The Hippodrome."

Two years later (1876), the famous bandmaster, gained control of the property, rechristened it "Glimore's Garden," and put on a series of concerts. It was not until 1879 that the place took the name of the beautiful park it faces and became Madison Square Garden.

To the city, however, it still was a railroad station.

Then, in 1889, largely as a public benefactor, the late J. P. Morgan and his son and 13 other of New York's wealthiest men financed the erection of a new building on the site, the one that stands today. It is a structure of brick and stone covering 32 city blocks between Madison and Fourth avenues on the edge of Madison Square. Its architecture is of the Renaissance style. An heroic figure of Diana in bronze pulses atop the tower.

The garden was designed so that it could be transformed in a few hours to suit any form of public entertainment, and it can seat 15,000 persons.

An army of workmen in an day always using "props" from the Garden's huge underground storerooms, to make a swimming tank here a preserve for a thousand newspapers there, a circus menagerie somewhere else.

A conveniently equipped theater with seats for 1,000 is tucked away in one corner of the Garden, staging daily performances independent of the main building.

A concert hall is nearly lost in another corner. Its roof garden was one of the first in the city.

Since 1912 the financial career of the Garden has been a hectic one. It wasn't paying, and it was only when its maintenance was assured for a period of three years by exhibition and sporting interests that it was kept open.

Caution on Farms Advised
PENDLETON, Ore., — Oregon sheep and cattlemen and ranchers should pay careful attention to the word "fence" as employees on their farms are now advised as preventing the spread of the threat of the hoof and mouth disease, according to Fred W. Calhoun, president of the Oregon Wool Growers' association, in a letter received here by Mae Robt. secretary of the association.
