Butler Gives Up Race For a Seat in Senate (Continued from page 1)

Senator Louis A. Coolidge, former assistant secretary of the treasury, is an avowed candidate for the nomination.

Mr. Butler and Friday, because of his selection as national chairman is dependent upon the nomination of Mr. Coolidge by the Cleveland convention and on the vote of the new national committee, he did not consider it desirable to announce now any plans for the presidential campaign.

Johnston Gives 15 Votes. Senator Johnston of California is given 15 delegates upon the list and Senator La Follette of Wisconsin is considered 25 delegates.

John T. Adams, the present chairman of the national committee, visited the White House Friday and afterward said his relations with the president were most cordial but he desired to retire as chairman and had no intention Thursday to Mr. Coolidge.

The retirement of Chairman Adams is expected to involve the retirement of George B. Lockwood of Indiana, secretary of the national committee, though Mr. Butler said Friday no decision had been made regarding a new secretary.

Agreement among advisers of the president and republican leaders generally an selection of Senator Wadsworth of New York as permanent chairman of the Cleveland convention developed Friday and it was disclosed his selection was considered at the meeting Wednesday in Cleveland of subcommittee on arrangements.

Senator Wadsworth conferred Friday with Secretary Skaggs. Another matter being considered by the president and his advisers is selection of a man to place the name of Mr. Coolidge before the convention. No decision has been reached but some of the president's advisers would not be surprised if Senator Borah of Idaho were asked to make the nominating speech.

The established procedure of such houses would extend in a resolution for material changes in the existing clause language of the same independent making their own, immediately, whereas the houses will set the operative date as July 1. Precedent were quoted for the statement that this change was sufficient to throw the whole schedule open.

Considerable doubt was expressed among senators Friday whether the conference would accede to the president's program and more doubt that it would be ratified by the senate if presented in a report. Incidentally along this line, inevitably brought people who involved a repetition of the unusual procedure by which first the exclusion and then the bill containing them had passed both the house and senate.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Complete removal of the foot and mouth disease quarantine in California from Marin, Sonoma, Santa Clara and San Mateo counties and from all except a small area in Nevada and Solano counties, in which the disease first broke out, once been announced by Dr. John E. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry.

A portion of San Joaquin county was also freed from quarantine and the quarantine regulations modified in portions of Alameda, San Joaquin, Kern and Los Angeles counties. Only the parts of those counties where the disease has not existed within 20 days are affected by the modification.

Only one of the six counties released from the quarantine, Solano, had actually contained infected herds. Federal officials felt that since there has been no appearance of the disease in the six counties it was not considered safe for normal activities to be resumed.

The modified regulations in the other counties provide that shipment of certain live stock and wool may be resumed and it is declared permissible to ship cattle, sheep and swine into these areas.

TO DISINFECT VOTERS. SACRAMENTO, Cal. (AP)—No new infections of the foot and mouth disease were reported Friday to the headquarters of the federal and state officials directing the fight against the malady.

Disinfection was granted for voters, isolated on quarantined farms and ranches, to visit the polls next Tuesday to participate in the state primary election, provided they underwent a disinfection process first and returned to the quarantined area immediately after voting.

ARIZONA IS CAREFUL. PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Arizona's committee investigating foot and mouth disease conditions in California Friday advised Governor Hunt that the situation in the neighboring state "is still very dangerous" and took a stand against modification of Arizona's rigid quarantine regulations.
