Wheat Crop Injured—
 E. H. Jackman of the O. A. C. extension service who will be the principal speaker at the meeting of farmers to grow certified seed potatoes stated this morning that the long dry spell of the early season had injured the wheat crop to a considerable extent so that just a very moderate crop can be expected. The irrigation projects, especially those that depend upon a steady supply of water are in bad shape and on this account the present indications point to a small hay crop also, he continued. Coupled with the fact that the supply of grass in the government forest reserves is below standard it is probably that the reserve supply of hay carried over from last year will be used before the end of the season, said Mr. Jackman. The meeting this evening at Imbler is the second one to be held for the purpose of organizing a potato growers' association. The agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce is sponsoring the movement.

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FLAG TOURNEY IS POSTPONED

Rain Causes Many Local Golfers to Retire from Links at Country Club Sunday.

Junior Flavius played havoc with the flag tournament Sunday on the country club golf links and as a result of rain and muddy grounds, all scores made yesterday will be barred and the tourney will be played at a later date. Several of the golfers finished yesterday but the greater share of them quit playing.

Next Sunday a 12-man team from La Grande will take part in a tournament at Pendleton. This team was to have been selected from the participants yesterday but designation of the team is still up in the air. They will probably be named, however, later this week.

No positive date for the flag tournament has been set.

To the Grande Ronde valley hundreds of visitors from all sections of the northwest and to cruise in Eastern Oregon had a more general interest in the livestock show than has ever existed heretofore.
