AIRMEN VISIT BOISE, IDAHO

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The aviators were guests at a banquet given for them by the directors of the chamber of commerce. Lieutenant Kelly took his place in the front cockpit and was soon followed by Major Wainwright whose seat is to the rear of the fuselage. Both men had donned aviator's coveralls and helmets.

The Prize Essay Contest is being sponsored by the Women's Overseas Service League, an organization composed of women who served with the expeditionary war.

Applicants may obtain information from the nearest county representative of the Citizens' Military Training Camp Association or from the chief of staff, 54th Division, Organized Reserve, Portland, Oregon.

The topic of the essay to be submitted is "Why a Young Man I Know Should Attend a Citizens' Military Training Camp." The essay will be limited to 200 words in length and may be typed or written with pen or pencil and must be in the hands of the state county or city representative of the Citizens' Military Training Camp Association before midnight, May 10. The essay will be judged by a committee upon their originality and sincerity.

The contest is limited to girls between the ages of 13 and 20 years. The nearest county representative to La Grande is Hugh E. Brady, La Grande, Oregon.

ship to the young folks of their parishes, and the young folks are responding by attending churches to unprecedented numbers. The United preachers are taking their cue from Rev. Nicholson, a recent American evangelist, who recently conducted revival campaigns in Belfast and several provincial towns. Rev. Nicholson, possessor of a picturesque vocabulary was outspoken about such matters as bobbed hair, transparent hose, peck-a-bug, transparent hose, and other accessories of feminine attire. Rev. Nicholson has returned to America, but his mantle has fallen on some of the home clergy. Instead of discussing epics, matters like the iniquities of one-piece bathing suits, the Uster dilemma are concentrating on the love theme.

"Love rules the court, the camp, the grove, the garden and the heaven and heaven is love."

They tell the anonymous lady and ladies who peek themselves into the pews and their dulcet phrases fall on sympathetic ears. The young folks of Ulster prefer listening to a preacher giving advice on how to bill and coil to bollocking the most romantic episode of the Bible or screen.

One other item about Scottish Presbyterianism which has been a topic of an Irish flock for several years, has been at pains to point out to his hearers the distinction between "self-love" and the real thing, "self-love," he told them, "should be regarded with suspicion."

This same doctrine chided the women for their duplicity. Many true lovers, he said, have been put aside by the independence of the woman, who unwarrantably concealed her affections behind a mask of cold reserve or even apparent aversion. Women, he declared, should present themselves in their true colors and give the young men a chance to become intimately acquainted.

Like the true Scot, however, he was practical and condensed caution. "Trust to no promises of reformation," he warned the girls, "to be postponed until after marriage, for if a man will not reform for you as a lover he will not be likely to reform as a husband."

Whereupon the congregation laughed and aroused the ire of the pastor. The subject of love, he warned them, should not be treated with levity. A Hindu or a Chinaman, he declared, would no more think of jesting about marriage or its concomitants than about death. "Frisson," he told them, "should take romance at least as seriously as a Hindu or a Chinaman takes it."

It has been stated that the purpose of the pupil campaign in teaching the young folks how to conduct their love affairs has been inspired by a falling off in the number of marriages throughout Northern Ireland. The general view, however, is that a number of clergymen have noted upon the ever-increasing subject of love to stimulate attendance at their churches.
