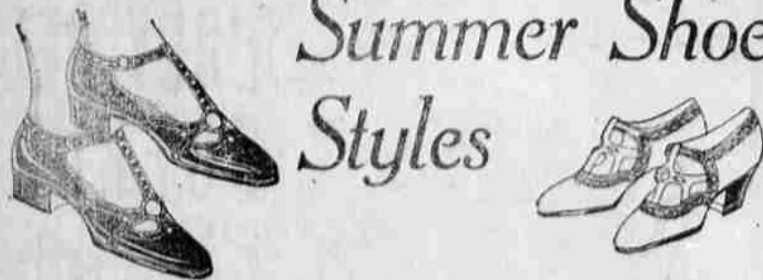

OLYMPIC TRIAL IS MAY 30-31

Eugene, Oregon, to Stage Pacific Coast Track and Field Meet Coincident With Tryout.

EUGENE, Ore. (Special).—The Olympic track and field tryouts for the Pacific coast will be held on Hayward field in Eugene May 30 and 31, in conjunction with the regular coast conference meet. This, said Jack Benefield, graduate instructor for the Associated Students at the University of Oregon, has been assured since the sanction of the other members of the conference has been gained and favorable word received from the Amateur Athletic Union officials.

The Eugene meet will give those selected to compete in the national tryouts, at Boston, 15 days in which to make the journey and recondition themselves for the final tryout with Olympic contestants from all parts of the United States.

The regular annual Pacific coast athletic track and field meet will call into action the best college athletes on the coast. Every coast institution capable of producing athletes is expected to enter a team in this contest. Among the institutions which will participate in the meet are: University of California, University of Washington, University of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural college, Lehigh, Stanford university, Rice College of Washington, University of Southern California, University of Idaho and the University of Montana.

his ability in competition with other outstanding sprinters to overcome the skepticism of Charles A. Dean, manager of the United States Olympic track team of the coast star's record of 9.2-5 seconds for the century, Dean has stated.

"Paddock's records, with the possible exception of the one he made in the Drake relay games a week ago, have been achieved in his native state," Dean said. He said Paddock had never competed against sprinters of the caliber of Evans and Murphison.

"It is my personal opinion that Paddock will not compete in the 1924 Olympic games," Dean stated. "It would be because he fails to qualify or an account of his recent difference with the Amateur Athletic Union, but because of a 'hunch' that defeat may be his portion."

Mr. Dean added that there was no question that Paddock was a great flyer and that he had the highest regard for his abilities.

AMERICA WILL HAVE TO 'HUMP'

Plenty of Competition at Olympic Games Promised Athletes From the United States.

NEW YORK (AP).—America's athletic supremacy promises to be challenged in the Olympic games this year to a greater extent than ever before, but on past performance this country's stars figure

to win again the major share of international honors.

A conclusive proof of the outstanding position held by America is that our athletes hold 35, or more than one-third of the 29 world's records for track and field events recognized by the International Amateur Athletic federation. Great Britain is next with 25 and Finland, which has but recently stepped to the forefront in athletics, is third with 12. These two nations, incidentally, loom as America's closest rivals for honors at Paris this year.

No other nation approaches the versatility of America, the lists show for Uncle Sam's track and field performers have established records in six of the seven distinct groups of track and field competition.

America leads the world in the runs, jumps, weight-lifting, hurdling and relay racing, a tabulation discloses, while Great Britain is preponderant in walking and Finland in javelin and discus throwing.

All running records from 100 to 1320 yards are held by American stars, but from one to 25 miles, England, chiefly through the work of Alfred Hitchcock, holds a majority of the marks on the books. The mile mark stood to the credit of an American, Norman Tager, until last summer, when Paavo Nurmi, Finnish star, stepped the distance to the astonishing time of 4 minutes 19.2 seconds. This has not yet been officially accepted by the I. A. A. F., but this is expected to be only a formality.

The United States has a monopoly in weight-throwing, the relay and in jumping, holding all but two of the 19 records listed in these classes. The pole vault record is held by a Norwegian, Charles Hoff, who last year shattered the own former record with a vault of 42.1 feet, or approximately 13 feet 8 1/4 inches. The only relay mark not held by this country is for 800 meters, for which Sweden holds the record.

Hawaii Proposes Mills To Solve Unemployment

HONOLULU (AP).—The establishment of a woolen mill here, to relieve Hawaii's present and prospective lack of employment, has been suggested to territorial and municipal authorities by Sheridan L. Bushy, retired wool grower of Montana, who has resided here in Honolulu several years.

The suggestion came as the result of a recent conference of police and other officers on the unemployment situation and its consequences, juvenile delinquency and immorality, and the need for diversified industries to furnish employment to persons who do not care to work on the sugar plantations and are little except for the seasonal activities of the pineapple planters and canners.

Establishment of a silk factory which might receive raw silk from Japan at a considerably less freight cost than is necessary to New York or other mainland factories to manufacture and ship the products to the mainland, also was suggested.

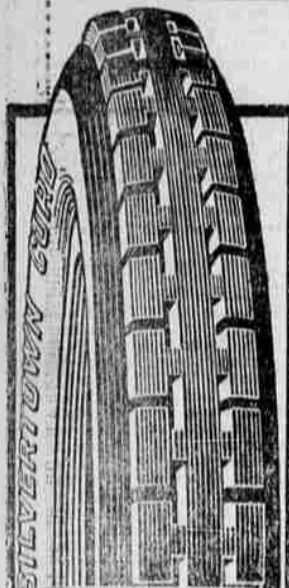
Bushy said that a woolen mill would be a safer and more profitable investment and would be more efficacious in solving the unemployment problem, as it would provide more opportunity for unskilled labor than a silk factory. He pointed out that Australia produces some of the finest wool in the world and said every mainland-bound steamer from the Antipodes carries a large cargo of this commodity, which is landed on the Pacific coast and shipped overland by rail.
