GIRL MURDER SUSPECT HELD

SALEM, Ore., (AP)—Two blood stained towels which officers found in his overcoat and what they believed to be blood stains on his vest, late Thursday caused Marion county authorities to catalogue C. W. Mann, alleged forger arrested here Tuesday, as a suspect in the Portland murder case, in which Martha Grable was a victim. Sheriff Fowler late in the afternoon was inclined to consider the eleven with some skepticism but this morning took Mann's fingerprints and sent them to Portland police.

The towels, which officers found Thursday at the home of a Salem woman acquainted with Mann, are of the type used on Pullman cars, a railroad track between Turner and Salem. An effort had been made to wash out the stains, but the attempt was unsuccessful.

Officers said Mann's description tallied fairly well with the description sent by the Portland police in the Grable case.

Mann is awaiting the grand jury on a forgery charge, which police say he confessed.

The sheriff's office has a letter which officers say was written by Mann and mailed in Portland April 22, the day on which the Grable girl was killed. Asked if he was in Portland that date, Mann replied that he didn't know. "I can't keep track of where I have been," he said.

The children had been hunting for squirrel traps in a field near their home when the bird swooped down upon them. One of the youngsters instinctively raised his hands above his head and the eagle took its talons into the child's flesh. The other children ran to his assistance and managed to release him after disabling the bird. It was killed later.

ALUMNI MEET THIS EVENING

University of Oregon Reunion Is to Be Held Throughout the Country Tonight.

This evening at 7 o'clock practically 100 per cent of the University of Oregon alumni in Union County will be seated around a banquet table in Holman Hall, marking the eve of the university campaign to raise one million dollars for the \$5,000,000 gift campaign.

Arlo C. Hampton, superintendent of the La Grande public schools and an alumnus of the university, also county chairman of the drive, will preside as toastmaster.

A telegram received from the University of Oregon states "Alumni of the University of Oregon, all over the nation, are meeting tonight at reunion dinners on the eve of their campaign to raise one million dollars for the five million dollar gift campaign."

"Over one hundred dinners will be held in various cities of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest and the rest of the country wherever five or more alumni reside. The alumni center their campaign under the stimulus of a most successful campaign on the campus at Eugene when the faculty subscribed more than \$5,000 or \$5,000 over the quota which they sought and the students also over-subscribed their quota, pledging \$215,000 in a campaign to raise \$200,000 to the total for the construction of an auditorium."

"The alumni effort is for a fund to erect a library, a men's gymnasium and a memorial hall in honor of University of Oregon men who died in the world war."

"The dinners tonight will form the largest reunion of the alumni ever held—literally reaching across the country from Portland, Oregon, to Portland, Maine."

Japanese Import Wheat

As Rice Prices Advance Vancouver, B. C. (AP)—The wheat in the price of native rice, the foreign Japan to buy Canadian wheat in heavy quantities, according to T. Shimizu, a representative of a Tokyo milling company who is investigating the wheat situation.

Mr. Shimizu said Canadian wheat could be imported by Japan at about 15 cents a bushel cheaper than Japanese wheat could be produced, and was much cheaper than rice. The Japanese people, he added, have come to prefer wheat to rice.

EUGENE, Ore., (Special)—Two Union county students attending the University of Oregon will be graduated in June, according to a report issued by the registrar.

They have applied for their master's degrees, eight for master of arts and two for master of science.

The students to be graduated at the annual commencement, Monday, June 16, are Marcella Berry, a major in the school of business administration of La Grande, and Darrell Larson, a major in the school of drama and the speech arts of Imbler. Both will receive bachelor of arts degrees.
