(Continued from page 1) will be four hundred and seventy-five million dollars next year. Democratic proposals for reduction in income schedules, modification of the corporation tax and full publicity of the tax returns, constitute the salient provisions of the measure.

These and other changes in the bill, as passed by the House, must now be taken up at conference. On motion of Senator Shipstead, farmer-labor senator from Minnesota, the senate voted today to reconsider the vote of yesterday regarding the bill.

The provision was approved yesterday by a vote of 45 to 40, and having previously passed the House. Upon reconsideration today the treasury tax proposal finally was rejected by a vote of 45 to 37.
