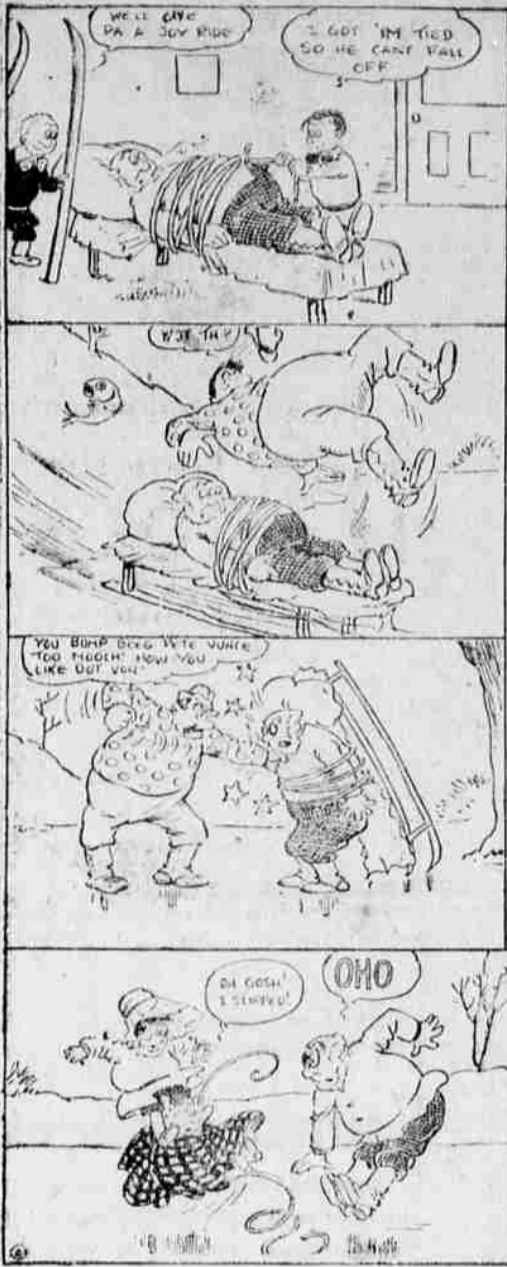

CLAY DEPOSIT NEAR SPOKANE

SPOKANE, Wash., (AP)—Valuable clay deposits, including what are believed to be the largest deposits of magnesian on the American continent, exist within a short distance of Spokane, according to the findings of a survey conducted in this region by the engineering experiment station of the University of Washington and submitted to the industrial bureau of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce by Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president of the university.

The survey shows that these clays open up a wide range of manufacturing activities, according to the report to the industrial bureau, but stress is laid by Dr. Suzzallo on the impracticability of development of more river industries than those in existence is making much profit.

"Emphasis should be placed," he said, "upon the development of the industry, utilizing new raw material, and developing new products now imported from outside the state.

"Spokane is in close contact with a large variety of raw economic materials," the report says. "A few miles to the north, near Chewelah, are found the largest

deposits of magnesian on the American continent. These have superior qualities for the manufacture of refractory, magnesian bricks which are in demand in the metallurgical industries.

Near Valley are found quartzite suitable for silica brick, another refractory article of great value in the iron and steel industries. The plastic white, buff and red burning clays, both north and south of Spokane, offer a range of coloring for face brick which cannot be exceeded. At the present time these clays are finding markets for sewer pipe, fire clay brick, stoneware, roofing, the quarry tile, flower pots and architectural terra cotta of the best quality."

PEAT BOG IS DISCOVERED

WALLA WALLA, Wash., (AP)—Workers digging drainage ditches in a marsh on the farm of W. F. Roper, near here, discovered a peat bog, samples of which have been found to include peat.

In some places the peat has been found within four inches of the surface and in layers about eighteen inches thick.

Samples of the peat examined by R. H. Brown, professor of physics, Whitman College, indicate that the formation was deposited there

many years ago and is composed of semi-decayed stems, roots and other vegetation. The peat is chocolate color and is being taken out in lumps like coal.

It has not been determined whether the deposit is extensive, although in some parts of the marsh covers about three acres of ground and will be examined more closely as the land is drained off.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (NS)—Reports from St. Louis that building hour stirred Columbus plumbers to a demand for an advance in their rate from 21, the present level, to 23.25 an hour. Plumbers are the only building tradesmen

here to demand such increases thus far, but persistent rumor is that other trades will seek similar advances.

American Boy, Under and Heavier Than English Lads

HEADING, England (AP)—Young America has the advantage both in height and weight over little John Bull, according to Doctor Millham, local health officer who, in his annual report, com-

pared English children examined during the last three years and American youngsters of similar ages. In every case, the doctor states, the advantage is with the American, a superiority which he believes becomes more emphasized in the older groups.

The average height of Reading boys of 12 years 3 months is given as 51 3/4 inches and the weight as 74 pounds as against 50 1/2 inches and 70 pounds respectively in the case of American children of corresponding age. It would appear, Doctor Millham adds, that the circumstances which assist growth in children are more favorable in America than in England.
