## HAINES LOSES SHUT-OUT TILT

IMBLER (Special).—The week-end witnessed the best high school baseball game for the first four innings that has been played in Eastern Oregon this year. The fact that the Imbler champions walked off finally with a one-run lead was due only to superior teamwork and especially slugging abilities.

For the first four innings Burton, the Haines pitcher, held the Imbler team hitless, while Imbler men were collecting five singles off of Ledbetter. In fact in the first inning Haines had filled the bases with men out when a fast double on a line drive, McKennon at second to Keown at third, spotted their chances and the next man struck out. In two other innings Haines had men dash over the home plate as the third man went out at first. In the fifth, four hits, two of them doubles, coupled with three errors gave Imbler a run and settled the game. Imbler played practically an errorless game.

## TRACK

### WASHINGTON STATE WINS FROM IDAHO UNIVERSITY

MORROW, Idaho (AP)—Washington State college won a final dual track meet with University of Idaho here Saturday, 791 to 513. The track events were slow but close. Idaho placed first in all track events but the hurdles and half mile, and, in addition, took first in the broad jump and pole vault. Other places in the events, however, ran up the score total.

Washington State freshmen won their meet against Idaho freshmen here 63 2-3 to 55.

The meet record for the distance was broken in the variety meet by Dacia of Washington State with a throw of 141.17 feet. Pickard of Idaho followed the Idaho record by several feet with his throw of 132.77 feet.

### U. OF O. VICTORIOUS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special).—The University of Washington track team defeated the Oregon track team here Saturday afternoon, 72 2-3 to 27 1-2. The Huskies started out with first places in the mile and eighth and were never headed. The time in the races was not exceptional.

Eighty Washington weight men, was high point man of the meet with first in the broad jump and discus, second in the shotput and first in the high jump, for a total of 14 1-3 points. Sparrow, Oregon jumper, was high point man for the Weibull team, with first in the pole vault and high jump and a third in the broad jump for 11 points.

Oregon proved stronger in the sprints and hurdles but Washington had a big advantage in the weights and distance events. Lucas, Oregon, won both the 100-yard dash and the 220, while his teammate, Cheever walked off with firsts in both hurdle races. The relay race was the most exciting event of the day. Oregon established an early lead, but Applegate, anchor man, put on a burst of speed in the home stretch and passed Halsey a few feet from the tape.

### UNITED STATES RUGBY TEAM IS OLYMPIC WINNER

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Colombus, France (By the Associated Press).—The American rugby football team Sunday won the right to meet France in the final match of the Olympic competition by defeating the Rumanian team 37 to 0. The score might as well have been 100 to 0 had the Americans wanted to pile up a large number of points. They were content, however, simply to win, and plainly held back against the little fellows from King Ferdinand's domain.

### Classic Marathon Race Is Crowd of Athletics

### NEW YORK (AP)—A silver cup donated by an enthusiastic

Frenchman, advised the plan to put such a race on the program when Baron Pierre de Coubertin first suggested the revival of the Olympic Games. The first race, held at the 1896 games at Athens, was won by a Greek shepherd for two days and spent the nights after his triumph in prayer before holy pictures. Astounding tales of human endurance have been told about athletes who have won honors in this long grand. In Antwerp in 1920, Haines Koeholstein, a Finn, won first honors in the Olympic record time of 2 hours, 22 minutes, 25 4-5 seconds, crossing the finish line 12 1-2 seconds ahead of J. Loosch of Belgium. Four minutes behind Loosch came a young Italian, A. Valerio who, upon crossing the finish line, turned about and denounced the spectators by turning a double somersault to prove his physical condition. A. Brown, a Belgian, followed the Italian to the tape and then made an extra lap of the big track carrying a shield with his national colors.

### BAKE RUTH HAS MOST HOMERS IN MAJOR LEAGUES

CHICAGO (AP)—Babe Ruth's homer, counted over the fence Saturday in the Yankees' game with Chicago, raised the home run king's season total to seven and gave him a lead of two over his nearest rivals. Four others are tied at five: Hank Greenberg, Detroit; Earl Hamner, Chicago National; Fothergill, Brooklyn and Williams, Philadelphia National.

Five men have gained four home runs—K. Williams, St. Louis and Hamner, Philadelphia, are the two American batters, while the three in the National league are Hornsby and Blades, St. Louis and Wheat, Brooklyn.

In the American league, St. Louis has a monopoly on the batter with three home runs, Jacobson and McManus having triple homers to their credit. The four

## Robert Service Candidate Says:

I believe that the people pay a great deal more for telephone service than they should; that the public should not permit the railroads to capitalize the increase in value of lands composing the railroad highway for that value did not add one dollar to their original cost, neither has it benefited the public one dollar; that the paramount interest in our railroads and utilities is in the Government or the people, and benefits, if any, accrue to the people.

I am opposed to the Esch-Cummings—cash plus—system for our public business, such as railroads and utilities, there being no incentive for economy.

Its effect is shown in the increase of 8,835 officers at a cost of \$17,000,000 while employees decreased 123,334, freight train miles decreased 18.8 per cent, passenger train miles 7 per cent and rates were raised.

Cost of operation is measured no matter how extravagant and the plus is too often paid on watered stock values that has no earning right.

I recommend the repeal of Section 5824 Oregon Law—it regulates the people and not the carrier; it deprives you of red by jury when freight rates are involved in Oregon.

I also recommend that actual cost, if practically made, be the value of railroads and utilities for rate making purposes and as the base for taxation and also to prevent further watered stocks and bonds being issued in violation of all principles of justice and right.

I believe it is time to look to the interests of the public, I will, if nominated and elected, probe the telephone and all other utilities to the bottom and, when thoroughly informed as to facts, will fight it out, in the courts if necessary, to establish reasonable rates and this is no little promise nor is it an empty pledge.
