Beauty Hints

The Thoughtful Beauty.
Here are some types of beauty which are more permanent than others, which have a more enduring, if not so vivid an appeal. Faces which we remember long after we meet their owners. Faces that reflect something of the soul of the character. Of such a type is the thoughtful beauty whose clear eyes look out from under fine, level brows whose line are firm as well as curved. This is a beauty which is more of outline than color which does not only belong to youth, but is an ornament of age.

The ancients divided feminine types of beauty into three, the Venus, the Juno, and the Minerva types. The Venus beauty emphasized physical beauty, the Juno was the maternal type, the Minerva the thoughtful or intellectual. The Minerva type is one of the highest in our modern civilization. It is sensitive, finely strung and capable of notable achievements. The coloring of this type is, as I have said, not as important as the contour, the modeling of their features. They may be fair, or medium, or dark, but they will always have a fine, clearness of intelligence. They will disregard all conventionalities of attire, of coiffure, or of adornment, comb their hair in classic simplicity, conforming to the line of the head, and leaving the forehead free. Short hair of the low style which flings to the head is not incompatible with this type, and is very often suited to her direct, straightforwardness.

The hair should be smooth and brushed to brilliantness. It may be slightly wavy, but without any suggestion of artificiality. The thoughtful type does not disdain the use of cosmetics. She merely demands the best, and uses it with discretion. This conservative type of woman, when she wears rouge in the daytime, she chooses a shade that tones, as correctly with her own color that she can discreetly, if merely, intensify the little flush on her cheek and the glint in her eyes. If her skin is olive, her hair dark, she chooses Ashes of Rosa. If she is fair, Mandarin. Her clear complexion will respond to the warmth of Peach or powder. In this type above all others, make-up, for the slightest touch, is essential to her charm.

The thoughtful type of beauty has one pitfall into which she must not fall. Because she does not attract at first sight like her sharper, more vivacious sisters who may force an unnatural gaiety upon her, she may, in other ways, defeat her own nature. To her I would say, be yourself, and you will like a magnet eventually attract to yourself those types which are congenial to your true nature. Where, as if you assume a fictitious personality, it will neither impress the frivolous nor gain the attention of the real friends which your own thoughtful charm would make.

Mother Seals Tender in Teaching Offspring

NINILCHUK, Alaska, (AP)—Maternal discipline is as pronounced among the hair seal family as among human beings, according to men who have spent many years along the shores of Cook Inlet and have studied aquatic life there.

From the time a baby seal is laid snugly within a bed of dry seaweed until he receives a final spanking and is directed to rustle for himself, he is subjected to unrelenting discipline. Contrary to popular belief, a baby seal is as helpless in the water as a human baby would be. It could be taught to swim and instructed in all the lore of seal life, including how to hunt food and escape its enemies.

Charles Conch, who has made his seal hunting a business for years, says he has watched a mother seal teaching her baby to swim. The mother would flounder out on the rocks, gather the baby under her flippers and slip carefully into the water. Suspending the baby on her flipper, she would bark, grunt, whim and sneeze to indicate what was desired. If the baby refused to perform, it was effective

quipped with the mother's flipper. The young seal gradually learns to swim by floundering a few strokes at a time, with the mother snatching it from danger every time it becomes exhausted or starts to sink.

Some of the Alaskan hunters adopt baby seals as pets. They become so attached to them and, in one instance, to a female seal, are so fond of them that they are ready to sacrifice their lives to save them. In one instance, a hunter was killed by a bear while he was trying to save a baby seal that he would rescue with his life. About midnight there was a pitched battle at the cabin door. THEORIES ARE MOSTLY BOSH

British Research Specialist Says Earth Plate-Shaped and Does Not Rotate.

LONDON (AP)—Most of the theories and speculations of modern science and philosophy are bosh, according to a research specialist.

After fifty years of observation, he states that he is convinced, among other things, that the earth is plate-shaped, flat, stationary and does not rotate, and that it is only 100 miles away from the sun, instead of the present estimate of 250,000,000 miles.

Edwell is attempting to obtain government support in presenting his theories before the British association royal, Sir Frank Dixon.

He maintains that it is a mistake that astronomers are becoming doubtful of the theories held to be true for centuries by their agreeing to hold an international conference under the Royal Geographical society's auspices shortly to decide to what extent the earth's surface is really round or flat.

"Galileo's rotation theory, introduced in 1625, and on which all modern ideas of the earth are based, is quite wrong, and Sir Isaac Newton's law of gravitation is certainly a myth," declared Edwell in an interview.

"It would be impossible," he said, "to view the stars and the sun and the moon if the earth were rotating on its axis at 1,500 miles per second and revolving in orbit at 100 miles per second."

Just as simply, he Newton discovered the forces of gravity by the apple falling on his head, so Edwell, he simply discovered the theory.

"There is no air pressure," he said, "it is merely a matter of air buoyancy. Things heavier than air naturally fall to the earth and vice versa."

"My first doubts as to the accuracy of the long-accepted scientific theories were raised at a school day," he declared, when he taught Victor Huxley's lesson concerning why his little world if the earth rotated at such a terrific speed, the atmosphere would be blown off, but this, of course, is ridiculous."

Edwell expects to fully convince many famous scientists of the soundness of his theories once he has obtained the support of the government.

ANTI-KISSING DRIVE IS ON

Rabid Reformers Would Out-law Promiscuous Osculation; Once a Month Permissible.

NEWARK, N. J. (AP)—Newspaper editors, joining the vast array of thirder parties.

"To kiss is to crush! It is vulgar! It is Victorian! Yes, it is thoroughly unhygienic. But it is enough that the kiss is not stylish, for the fashionists must certainly be not going to be out-fashioned."

That is, as the anti-kissing clubs of Newark have decreed it, to kiss more than once a month belongs to the age of braided hair, corsets, merry widow hats, and, yes, even laces.

However, one kiss a month, although enough, is yet within the bounds of style, sophistication and hygiene. But mind you, if this compromise with the protesting young ladies is violated, it will cost you cents per violation, to be paid by the kissor and into the coffers of the anti-kissing club!

All this has come about as the result of a flapper revolt, inspired by Dr. Charles Craster, city health officer, and Mrs. Pollard, of the board of education. The two have pointed out the pitfalls of unregulated flirtation—not moral danger, but purely hygienic ones.

So, in the name of health and beauty and long life, the girls are setting an new ideal for flappers during Girls' Week, when Newark was governed by high school girls and had its first girl mayor, Miss Elizabeth Buett, the anti-kissing campaign was launched.

Dr. Craster's resolutions on the kiss had won them.

"The mouth is a perfect incubator," he told them in the cold rooms of his antibiotic. "It is warm, perpetually 32 degrees, it is dark and it is moist. Any germ thrives and propagates under the ideal conditions the mouth offers it."

"Thus, in a kiss, deadly germs find splendid opportunity to get a change of scenery."

And similar warnings were given against the lipstick and powder puff.

"Kisses stick," Dr. Craster points out, "borrow and lend their lipstick and powder puffs. This

exchange of things touched to sensitive parts of the skin presents just another chance for the carrying of germs.

"Lipsticks, powder puffs and kisses are as unwholesome as the public drinking cup," he declared.

As for the aesthetic side of the question, Dr. Craster said kissing is a superficial habit, having no physical basis.

"One can get the same spiritual and physical reaction through the eyes," he asserted, "or by rubbing noses and by touching hands. Kissing is unhygienic. Everybody used to kiss babies on the mouth. Do they do it now? No, and young people won't be so prone to promiscuous kissing either, when the shrews thereof are pointed out to them."

The girls were convinced. To lead their labors more authoritatively they make kissing old-fashioned—except for the one a month. And that is a bit of ball in reserve to entice Newark's young nation.

CARRIED AWAY BY BIG KITE.
