Psychology Plus Chemistry

Psychology is ever playing a greater part in education. An innovation in tests was tried this morning in the high school by Glen Campbell, head of the science department in which an intelligence test was combined with a regular chemistry quiz. Each student was given a sheet of paper on which had been inscribed a large circle with a star, a triangle, a square and an octagon on the inside. The paper was turned down and the instructor read the questions aloud. One of the questions read as follows: "If chemical energy can be created place the figure 7 in that portion of the start which is inside the square and also wholly inside the triangle, but if the law of the conservation of energy holds true for chemistry and physics alike, then place the figure 11 in that portion of the octagon which is outside both the square and triangle yet inside the star." On the completion of the question by the instructor the students were given from 30 to 60 seconds to place the marks on their papers. Six questions given. The papers have not been graded as yet so the results of Mr. Campbell's experiment are not known.

Baker Claims Big Lead

In a message to the Evening Observer this afternoon George L. Baker, candidate for United States senator on the republican ticket, says: "Statewide reports indicate overwhelming success and the highest majority ever recorded for a candidate."

Prediction from Umatilla

According to a telegram received late today from David Nelson, prominent republican of Pendleton, to J. H. Pearce of city McNary and Stuart will lead by 1000 to 1500 in Umatilla county in tomorrow's primary. Mr. Pearce gave out this information this afternoon, as the telegram from Nelson was addressed to him.

339,612 Registered Voters

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Oregon's 339,612 registered voters tomorrow will have opportunity to express their preference for presidential nomination and select candidates for United States senator, national convention delegates, representatives in congress, state officers, state legislators, and county officers. Republicans registered number 233,623, democrats 91,485. The others registered are scattered among various political faiths.

On the republican side President Calvin Coolidge is opposed by Senator Hiram W. Johnson, of California, for the republican nomination preference. Among candidates for delegates at large to the republican national convention six are declared for Coolidge. Four express preference for Johnson, but say they will abide by the preferential choice of the party in Oregon. Five of the candidates for delegates at large express no choice. William G. McAdoo is announced for the state's preferential choice for the democratic nomination for president.

One of the hottest fights of the primary election is for the republican nomination for United States senator. Senator Charles L. McNary is opposed by Mayor George L. Baker of Portland, E. K. Kuhl of Portland, and H. H. Stallard of Portland.

For the republican nomination for congressman from the first district Representative W. C. Hawley is opposed by Peter Zimmerman, of Yamhill. In the second district George T. Cochran, of La Grande, is seeking the nomination against Representative N. J. Snodgrass. In the third district (Multnomah county) M. J. Crum-packer, Franklin E. Kossel and Arthur I. Monahan are battling for the republican nomination, while Representative E. R. Watkins, democratic incumbent, is opposed for the democratic nomination by E. E. Brackney, of Portland. For the democratic nomination for United States senator there are four contenders, Will R. King, of Portland, George A. Mansfield, of Prospect, Milton A. Miller, of Portland, and W. H. Strayer, of Baker.

In the first congressional district the democratic candidates are H. S. Clark, Salem, W. E. Ewing, Oakland, Will M. Purdy, Salem. In the second congressional district James Harvey Graham, of Baker, Ralph W. Swagler, of Ontario, and B. E. Wilson of Union are seeking the democratic nomi-

nation for representative in congress.

On the state ticket Sam A. Koger, secretary of state, has no opposition for the republican nomination.

For state treasurer the candidates are E. H. Campbell, of Portland; Thomas B. Kay, of Salem; Frank S. Seavey, of Portland. Other candidates on the republican ticket are:

For justice supreme court: Harry H. Bell, Dallas; J. W. Knowlton, La Grande; Harry S. Westbrook, Portland.

Attorney General: Robert Kuykendall, Portland; E. H. Van Winkle, incumbent, of Salem.

Barry and food commissioner: J. D. Mickle, Hillsboro; Harry D. Miller, Newburg.

Public service commissioner: H. H. Green, Baker, incumbent; Robert Berkey, Baker.

Public service commissioner, western district: Charles J. Brown, Medford; R. T. Russell, Salem; Edward Ostrander, Portland.

On the democratic state ticket there is no candidate for attorney general and dairy and food commissioner. For secretary of state Walter J. Hendree, of Yamhill county, is unopposed. State Treasurer Jefferson Myers has no opposition for the democratic nomination. C. P. Koslow, of Roseburg, is unopposed for the democratic nomination for justice of the supreme court. J. B. Brown of Gilliam county, is the sole candidate for the democratic nomination for public service commissioner, western district, and Newton McCoy, of Portland, for public service commissioner, western district.
