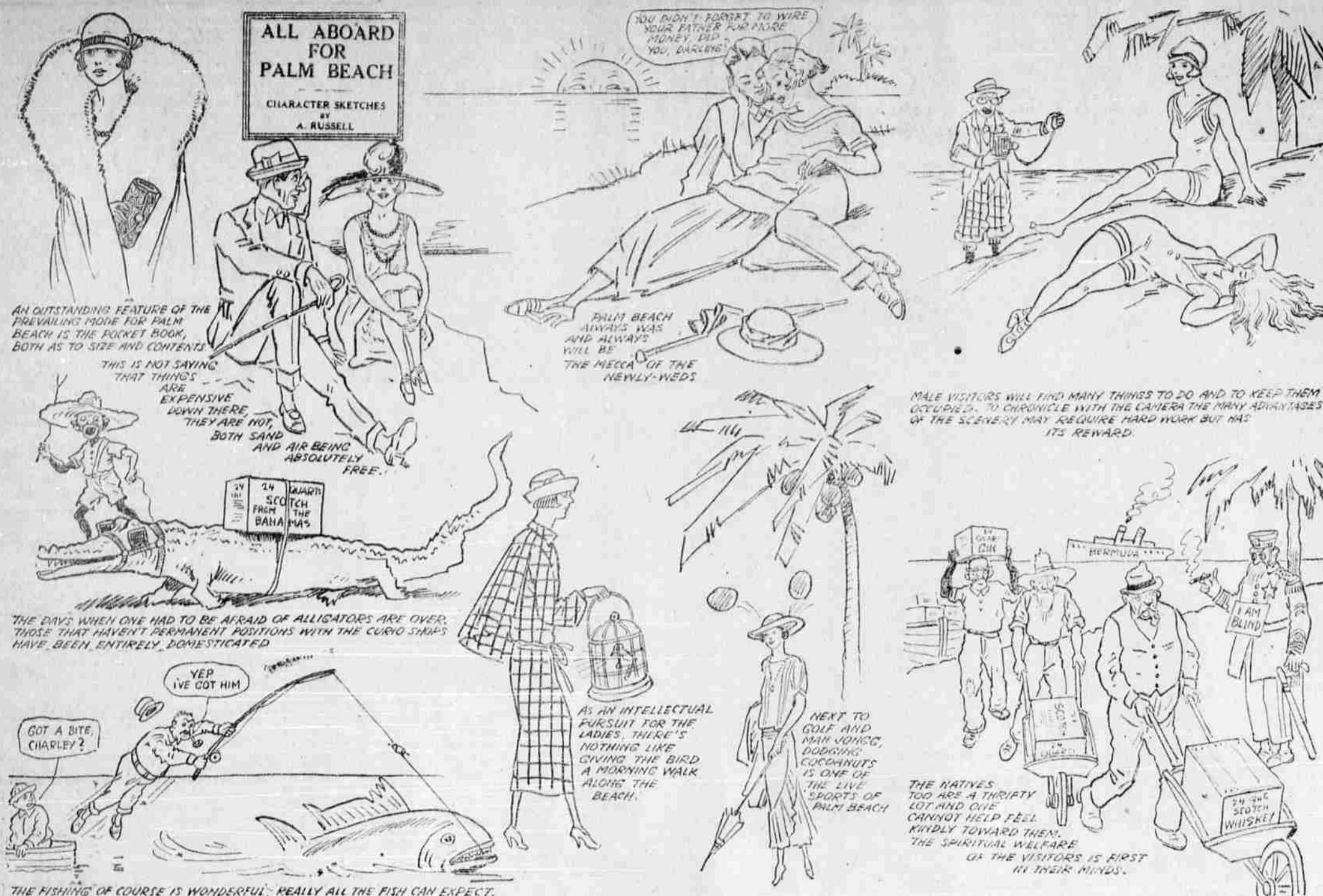




FISHING GOOD AT THE PARK

Many Anglers Seek to Land Fish in Catherine and Adjacent Streams.

THE PARK (Special).—There has been a number of anglers on the creek since the first of the month. Although the water is high and muddy, many trout have been landed. All were good sized fish. PLEBEIAN UNION BANNED FROM CHELSEA SHOW

LONDON, (AP).—Onions may be good in salads, with bread and cheese, or for flavoring purposes, but the sensitive nostrils of the rulers of the Royal Horticultural Society don't like the odor of this useful vegetable, and have barred it from the next Chelsea Show, a society function because of its "horrid smell."

"An onion smell is at any rate a healthy smell and ought to be resented and satisfy the sense of the real horticulturist as reality as the aroma from the finest lot of roses."

Women Police on Increase.

GENEVA, (AP).—Women police are increasing throughout the world, notably in the United States and Great Britain, according to an investigation made by the permanent League of Nations commission for the suppression of the international traffic in women and children. The commission voiced its satisfaction at this development, recording its opinion that the appointment of women as members of police forces would have a beneficial effect in the protection of the interests of women and children throughout the world.

U. S. NAVY IS NOT IN LEAD

WASHINGTON, (AP).—Admission that "a fair comparison of the present fighting strength in ships of Great Britain, America and Japan would place the American navy in second place" is made by Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, in a report to Chairman Butler of the house naval affairs committee.

The opinion that the American navy thus has fallen below an equal ratio strength with Great Britain as provided in the 1906-1907 naval treaty was expressed by Mr. Roosevelt, in a report commenting, at Chairman Butler's request, on a recent article in the New York Times by W. B. Stearns, naval expert. The assertion in the article that the ratio of naval strength between the powers is 5-3-1 with the American navy in the last position, was declared by the assistant secretary to be "greatly exaggerated."

Costumes of Women Rowers Shock

LONDON, (AP).—Some members of the Boat Rowing Association are shocked at the costumes, or lack of them, worn by women at regattas. At the annual meeting of the association it was announced that complaints had been received of several rowing women

wearing too scanty attire, being decked out with shorts or skirts only reaching half way down the thighs.
