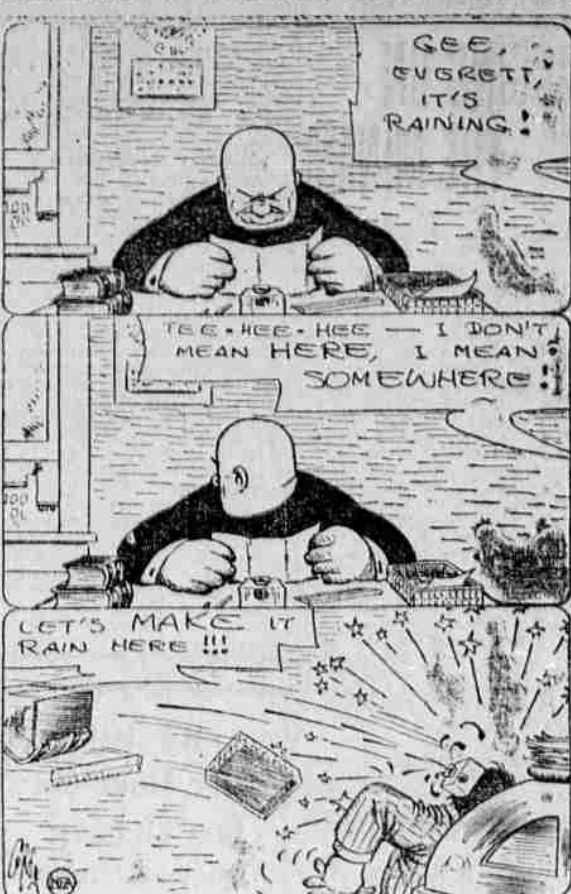

PITCHERS ARE COSTLY BIRDS

Magnates Pay Fat Sums for New Twirlers Who Seem to "Know Their Stuff."

NEW YORK, (AP)—An outstanding feature of the baseball season this spring has been the unprecedented demand for capable young pitchers. Managers combed the country for promising box recruits, nursed them along during early workouts with all the solicitude shown by a landlord for his annual lot of coal, and started the youngsters in league games whenever possible.

The reason for this unusual demand for pitching talent is that the fans are growing weary of sluggers and lopsided scores. Sentiment is growing for a return to the day of 1-0 and 2-1 pitching battles when the slugout was greeted with louder acclamations than the home hit when people would travel miles to witness a box duel between such renowned hitters as Christy Mathewson and Minnie Brown.

Plenty of Sluggers. Catering to the home-run craze, the club owners went after sluggers last year, and they got them. Home-run sluggers are now thicker than flies at a dog show. The Detroit Tigers, for instance, ran out a complete team batting over .300 on the field. Yet Cal's would swap a handful of his home-batting beauties for a couple of pitchers who could take their daily shower at 5:30 instead of 4 o'clock.

In an effort to bolster up their pitching staffs, big league managers imported unusually large shipments of ivory into the orange groves this year for close inspection. Each club furnished nine or ten young boxmen with bed and board for nine expensive weeks. In the hope of finding one or two who could make the grade, even Miller Huggins, with his championship staff, took several youngsters into his private study and endeavored to tell them all the things that a growing pitcher should know.

Big Prices Paid. Sums that would make a Scotchman shudder were expended for minor league pitchers who appeared to have a chance of winning twenty games a season in the big show. John Mervyn gave Louisville enough money to lift the mortgages off all the farms in Horatio Alger's romance by digging \$15,000 out of the strongbox for Wayland Dean, the youngster who has done splendidly.

Paris War Panorama

May Come to America

INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—An offer of the owner of The Pantheon de la Guerre, a panoramic picture of the World war, to have the American Legion sponsor its American exhibition, will be among the subjects considered by the national executive committee of the Legion, at its meeting here beginning May 15. One representative from each of its departments, five national vice-commanders and the national commander composed the committee.

Building requirements in Paris provide that no temporary lighting such as that which now houses the panorama, may remain standing for more than five years, a time limit which soon expires. Headquarters states. The painting is 24 feet long, 45 feet high and is said to have 6,000 scenes. Fifty artists required nearly four years to complete the work. The late Wood-

row Wilson and other Americans are central figures.

Other matters to come before the meeting include authority for establishing a traveling exhibit or war relics, the number of the proposed Legion National museum, a proposal to encourage the arrival of the first American troops in France by the erection of a monument at St. Nizier, and endorsement of a memorial to Woodrow Wilson to be built in West London. This project originated in Tennessee.

Among matters of particular interest in the organization which will be considered by the committee will be the membership problem and the creation of a national and state branch division, and conduct and rules concerning national conventions of the organization.
