South Presbyterians Educate, Give Relief

SAN ANTONIO (AP).—Presbyterians of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States have under their care 646 candidates for the ministry and mission service, exclusive of women candidates for mission service, said the report of the executive committee of Christian education and ministerial relief, made today before the assembly in session here.

The committee added 452 candidates for the ministry and mission service in the year just closed, 29 more than in the previous year, the report stated, and in this connection spent \$77,902. "In our campaign for equipment and endowment funds, our schools and colleges of the church in Texas is becoming a reality," continued the report. "Collections amounting to more than \$5,000,000 in other synods are reported. "The endowment fund for ministerial relief is now more than \$1,470,000, and in keeping with the report of the assembly, efforts are being made to increase this fund to \$2,500,000. The total amount received from the endowment fund the past year was \$2,162,131, which is \$34,141 less than the amount received the year before.

"Total receipts from all sources were \$241,159, a decrease of \$44,720."

League of Nations To Protect Inventors

GENEVA (AP).—Supplementing the increasing collaboration of the United States government with the League of Nations, numerous representative American institutions continue to extend their cooperation with the organization. The American Patent Law association is showing keen interest in a league project to afford adequate protection to the discoveries of scientists and inventors, and will send several representatives here this summer to take part in a preliminary meeting of experts which will discuss some definite measures of protection.

The matter came before the League of Nations in the form of a project elaborated by Senator Ruffalo of Italy. The league assembly voted that the Ruffalo project, which has the form of a draft convention, be distributed to all governments for their opinion. It seems likely that American lawyers will take a leading part in this league undertaking just as they will in another league plan to form an international association to coordinate world efforts in furnishing legal assistance to the poor.

American lawyers are active also in another league project for the printing and distribution of the treaties which are considered with the league secretariat. Last year the American Society of International Law subscribed \$10,000 to the purchase of the treaty series. It has renewed its subscription this year and will distribute some 500 sets to libraries and law associations the world over. This league undertaking is regarded as an important step in the desired codification of international law.

FOREST SEASON TO OPEN

JOHN DAY, Ore.—A strong movement is in progress to remove the headquarters of the Malheur national forest from John Day to Canyon City. Citizens of Burns are seeking the headquarters, asserting that the town is suitably located owing to the opening of the vast timber belt known as Bear valley. Forest crews are working overtime to get the trails opened up preparatory to start of the fire season.

"A big rain will save the forest," declared Forest Supervisor Fred, who is living out his men for the summer. O. L. Starr, principal at Canyon City, has been appointed to take the field's peak lookout, the only position left vacant from the old season.

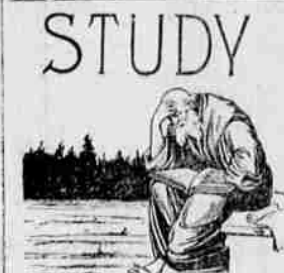
