All of the sixth graders earned above seventy in the hygiene test and all except one of the seventh passed in geography. This puts Union among the first schools in the county in point of the percentage of the students who passed the examination, and also in regard to the standing in grades.

School closed Friday of last week and some of the teachers have gone elsewhere for their vacation, but most of those who will be here for another year will remain in Union during the summer.

At the commencement Thursday evening high school diplomas were handed out to 33 students, the largest class graduating in the history of the school. Willie Haggerty held the highest grades for the year just ending, and Max Jensen stood highest in scholarship for the four years of the course. Two money prizes, a fountain pen, and a silver cup were presented to the two who stood highest for the senior year's work. The cup and five dollars went to Haggerty and two and a half dollars and a fountain pen to Henry Halsey, who stood second in scholarship for the year.

Giant Power Plant Planned To Serve All Eastern Japan

TOKIO, (AP)—An electric generating plant, to cost \$22,000,000, will be completed on the Shimano river, in the mountainous district 19 miles northwest of Tokio, according to an announcement by the department of railways.

This plant is to furnish power for distribution over all the central portion of Japan, feeding the electrical services of Tokio and also supplying power for the Tokaido railway, which connects the capital with Osaka and Kobe, and which is to be electrified within the next few years.

Obscene Book Traffic Treaty Ratified by Two More States

GENEVA (AP)—The Irish Free state, which was elected a member of the League of Nations last September, has just ratified its first

League convention.

Michael McWhite, the permanent Irish representative here, has informed the secretariat that the Dublin government has officially approved the treaty for the suppression of

the traffic in obscene publications.

Ruchdi Bey, the Turkish minister at Bern, also has notified the league that he has been authorized to sign this convention in behalf of Turkey. Turkey is expected to apply for league membership as soon as the great powers have completed their ratification of the Lausanne treaty.
