NEW YORK, (INS) — Entries have started to pour in on the American Olympic Committee from all sections of the country for the final Olympic wrestling tryouts which will be held at Madison Square Garden on May 27, 28 and 29 in connection with the big three day program of gymnastics, boxing and wrestling which the American Olympic Committee is conducting to determine the best gymnasts and wrestlers in the United States to represent this country in the Olympic Games in France next July.

The entries received by E. W. Steil, Jr., chairman of the Olympic wrestling committee came from New Orleans, Birmingham, Waterloo, Iowa; Northfield, Vt.; Springfield, Mass., and Ithaca, N. Y. The majority of the entries received are for the lightweight, light heavyweight and the heavyweight classes.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Ed "Strangler" Lewis successfully defended his world's heavyweight wrestling title Wednesday night against Benato Gardini, claimant of the Italian championship. Gardini won the first fall in 25 minutes 15 seconds with a toe hold.

### Olympic Swimming Pool Largest in the World

PARIS, (AP) — The Olympic swimming pool at the Bois de Boulogne, across the city of Paris from the Athletic Stadium at Colombes, is practically completed.

Long delays in construction of the immense pool, for the pool will stand the City of Paris 10,000,000 francs when completed, have caused to flow as much ink as would fill it; but the Olympic officials are sanguine that no further criticism will be forthcoming, and they are already claiming the distinction of having "the greatest swimming pool in the world."

The pool itself is 50 yards in length by 18 wide and five deep at the deeper end.

Accommodations for 10,000 people is provided in the Stadium which surrounds the pool and 40 dressing rooms are distributed underneath the stands. They comprise 750 separate cabins, permitting that number of athletes to dress at the same time.

The French realize that they have spent a lot of money in this affair, but the stadium was only the pre-text; the swimming pool was the object. They say they have built a solid monument to water sports which will stand long after the 1924 Olympic games are forgotten.

## SWEDES READY FOR OLYMPICS

STOCKHOLM, (AP) — Sweden's preparations for the Olympic games this year began immediately after the end of the 1923 Olympiad. The games are taken much more seriously in Sweden than in some of the larger states. The Swedish Olympic committee, a permanent body re-elected with new members after each Olympiad, has been keeping its eyes on the probable athletes of the country, so that it will have little difficulty in making the final selection of the team to go to Paris.

The strength of the Sweden will be concentrated largely in swimming, light athletics and horsemanship. Only men believed to have a good chance of winning prizes will be placed on the team. Consequently, Sweden's delegation will be smaller than the national contingent that went to Antwerp four years ago.

In water sports the outstanding entry from Sweden is Arne Borg, who has been visiting Honolulu recently. His best records at several distances rank even, or almost so, with those of Johnnie Weismuller, and, on more than one occasion, he has improved upon the times set by the Australian prodigy, Allan Charlton.

Nils Trolle, another swimming star of Sweden, has covered 100 meters in just a fifth of a second over one minute. The Helsinki brothers will enter events calling for swimming on the back. They are also ready diving events will also be contested by Sweden.

In the riding path this country has no printers of outstanding speed, but in the longer races of from 1500 meters onward, there are several first-class men available. The severity of the winter has hampered preparations for outdoor races.

The Swedish cavatory hopes to retain the high place it won both at Antwerp and eight years before at Stockholm. The stars of the former games will be mounted again this summer.

Erse Is Taught in Ireland's Schools

DUBLIN, (INS) — An intensive campaign to revive Erse as the national Irish language is being undertaken by the Irish Free State government.

Nearly all public notices in this city are now printed in Erse, as well as in English, while Erse has been made compulsory in the elementary schools, and all the national school teachers have been compelled to learn it.

For every teacher who knows Irish thoroughly, however, there are a dozen who hardly know it at all, with the result that the children are not learning their national language, but a hopeless jargon of English and Irish which cannot hope to survive.

Hundreds of teachers and speakers from the purely Erse-speaking districts such as Connemara, Kerry and other parts of the south and west, have been transported to all parts of the country in order to teach the "back to Erse" movement, and it seems fairly likely the campaign will succeed in its objective.

British Women to Contrast "The Good Old Days and Now"

LONDON, (AP) — The national council of women has chosen the title of "The Good Old Days and Now, 1824 and 1924" for the series of lectures to be given during their own particular week at Wembley, June 16 to 20.

Miss Leon Ashwell will speak on "Amusements and the Stage"; Mrs. H. A. L. Fisher on "Laws Concerning Women"; Professor Winifred Collins on "How Women Earned Their Living"; Miss Peck, author of "Literature"; Miss E. Lillian Barker on "Dressing and Training the Stern Age and the New"; Dr. Jane Walker on "Widows and No Widows." The lectures, while imparting instruction, will be kept light in tone in order to attract many exhibition visitors.

## LADY BUGS IN WAR APPAREL

Advance Guard of Pests Arrive at Wenatchee to Look Over the Orchards.

WENATCHEE, Wash., (AP) — Fifty hundred thousand lady bugs, the advance guard of several million more who will participate in the "battle of the orchards" in this district this summer, have arrived here under the personal supervision of Clark Turner of Osnab, Wash., owner of the army. The lady bugs are used to destroy the aphids, an insect pest which annually causes considerable damage to the fruit trees.

For many years Mr. Turner has studied the habits of the bug and has finally succeeded in introducing its life-saving ground which he says, are to the Osoe side mountains extending from British Columbia to Oregon. Every year he makes a trip to the winter quarters of the bugs and selects enough at an early date for his spring activities.

The bugs are held in wooden containers where they multiply rapidly. Mr. Turner estimates that ten thousand of them with their natural propensities will protect one acre of orchard during the season.
