HUGE CHANGES ARE FORECAST

Electrical Development Possibilities Are at a High Figure, Is Report

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—(Press) market possibilities amounting to billions of dollars are forecast by the electrical industry. In the case of the electric light and power industry, the available market represents a potential development greater than that developed during the 40-year life of the industry. Conservative estimates place the possibilities not yet developed as representing an annual revenue of more than two billion dollars as against a gross revenue during 1922 of only one billion three hundred and sixty million dollars.

The above statement is contained in a paper on "Electricity" delivered by Charles J. Russell, vice president of the Philadelphia Electric company, presented before the National Electric Light association convention here today.
