OREGON TRAIL BOOKLET OUT

Third Edition of Pamphlet Off the Press—Distribution to Occur Shortly.

BAKER, Ore. (Special)—The third edition of the Old Oregon Trail, the road that won an empire, a handy little book both for tourist and for educational purposes has just come off the press.

This edition of 25,000 will make a total of 75,000 copies of the booklet which have been printed during the last three years and has found a ready distribution among all the chambers of commerce, associations, schools and libraries of the United States.

In contrast the book commences with the history of the Trail, as well as a detailed relation of the discovery of the Oregon country.

Fourteen maps are of valuable aid to the tourist as they tell the route of the complete trail from Independence, Missouri, to Seaside, Oregon, the Trail's End.
