Where Cancer Cure Was Effectuated



"One of the rarest cases in medical history" is what noted scientists are terming the complete cure of Miss Celia Trubie, who was considered an incurable cancer case two years ago. The cure was effected through the combined use of radium and X-rays developed from a new machine capable of 200,000 volts. Dr. William H. Livingston, assistant medical director of Montefiore Hospital, New York City, who announced the discovery, is shown here preparing for treatment of another patient. The instrument shown is that used in the treatment of Miss Trubie, whose cure is considered particularly exceptional because she was in such an advanced condition.
