YANK RUNNERS ARE PROMISING COOLIDGE NOW GAINING VOTES

Trackmen Look Ready for Olympic Marathon—Hopes for Victory Higher.

NEW YORK, (AP)—America's hope in the marathon, classic distance feature of the 1924 Olympic games at Paris in July, will be higher than at any time since the spectacular triumph of Johnny Hayes 16 years ago at London. That year, 1908, Hayes was victorious after Borzaga, great Italian runner, collapsed when within sight of the finish. Olympic officials helped Borzaga across the line, but he was disqualified and Hayes, the next finisher, was awarded first prize.

One other American victory shows on the records of the seven Olympic marathons held since 1896. That was in 1904, at St. Louis, when Heila bronzed the tape in the long trial.

Since 1908, however, no American has finished better than third although the wearers of the Star and Stripes, as a whole, made a formidable showing at Stockholm in 1912. In that race, Gustav Svanberg took third place, behind Artur and Oskar, the South Africans, while six other Yankee runners were in the first 12 finishers.

This year the United States will send its six best long-distance runners to the start with northern confidence placed in Clarence H. DeMar, 28-year-old, Mezzano, Mass. athlete marvel who established his right to lead the Yankee squad when he won the Boston marathon last Olympic tryout, for its fourth time, shattering the American record and bettering the Olympic record for the distance of 26 miles, 385 yards.

DeMar's time for this race was 2 hours, 25 minutes, 49.15 seconds, only a second slower than the recognized world's marathon record hung up by Willie Kahanainen of Newark, N. J., in 1912. Willie's brother, Hannu, won the Olympic marathon for Finland at Antwerp four years ago and set a new standard for the growth of 2:22:12.45.

DeMar is a marathoner of the type of Tom Longboat, famous Indian. He is long, lean and apparently tireless. He both has a strong, exceptionally high, and derives very little power from his swinging. His legs are stiff, but well muscled at the knees and feet.

President Is Assured of Nineteen Delegates for Him from West Virginia.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., (AP)—West Virginia voters on May 27 will ballot in a presidential and state primary election, and the presidential feature is almost insured.

The name of Calvin Coolidge stands alone on the republican ballot, and the democrats will have no presidential preference because no candidate filed an endorsement. The delegation of 19 to the republican national convention is thus assured to the president, the state law providing the delegates to the winner of the presidential primary. The delegates' eight delegates at large, with one-half vote each, and the 12 district delegates, consequently have

been placed on the ballot. The only other two other republican runners in Charles L. Steffen, a Chicago, and Frank R. Wendling, an Idaho, a necessary to indicate their support. They finished second and third, respectively, in the Boston tryout. William J. Campbell of San Francisco and Carl Linder of Boston, also were members of the team, while the sixth man will be Charles Tom Lynch, Zeno, of New York, N. Y., and Ralph Williams, of Quincy, Mass.

Zeno, who won this year's Hillshire and Detroit marathons, was regarded as the best of the party until he dropped out of the Boston race because of stomach trouble. If he returns to form by the time of the Olympic event he will be strongly favored.

no official instructions. Presidential candidates are an issue only in the second congressional district where Samuel T. Spears of Elkins, supporting W. G. McAdoo, seeks to be one of the district delegates. Hoff, former assistant attorney general of the United States; and Dr. M. V. Godbey of Charleston are the republican senatorial candidates, while on the democratic ballot former senator W. E. Chilton opposes Mrs. Julia Jewell Brown, widow of a former congressman.
